
Council Vindicates Lynn of All Charges

Threats Ignored as Council Votes Issue

Torrance city councilmen deservedly have earned the admiration of their constituency following their rebuff of attempts to intimidate them Wednesday night.

Councilman George Bradford, during a lull between two of the more hotly contested issues on the evening's agenda, noted that he had received two phone calls from anonymous persons during the day.

The first call flatly told him "don't show up for tonight's meeting," while the second threatened physical violence to himself and his family if he (1) voted to rezone the controversial Marble Estates tract from industrial to residential use, and (2) if he voted to place Public Works Director Wade Peebles in the now vacant city manager's post

A second councilman, George Vico, immediately reported that he, too, had received a threatening call on the subject of Peebles' candidacy for the top administrative post of the city. He promptly moved that Peebles receive the position, Bradford seconded the motion, and the motion passed 4-3 with Mayor Albert Isen and Councilman Victor Benstead providing the

Vico had previously found himself in the position of breaking a 3-3 tie for Peebles' appointment, but had declined to vote, stating "he wanted more time to think

It is to the everlasting credit of these men that they did not allow themselves to be swayed by this kind of threat. Recognized, ninety five percent of these kinds of calls are made by the "crackpot" or the "crank," But that other five percent can look mighty large when it involves the safety of your family and yourself/


