Norco Construction Company Submits Low Bid for East Torrance Storm Drains

Apparent low bid for construction of the East Torrance bond issue storm drain, projected by the Norco Construction Co., has been submitted to the Board of Supervisors for award of the contract will be submitted by County Flood Control officials within three weeks.

Stiff competition for the project was evident with 10 companies submitting proposals, ranging from the apparent low of \$585,101 to a high of \$848,280.

All bids are now being analyzed and checked for accuracy and it is anticipated the recommendation to the Board of Supervisors for award of the contract will be submitted by County Flood Control officials within three weeks.

This means that if the bids are determined to be satisfactory preliminary construction work will be started the latter part of September.

Line A begins at 188th street and Crenshaw boulevard and extends south on Crenshaw to 190th street, then east to Van Ness and south on Van Ness to Del Amo boulevard.

Line B will begin at an existing drain west of Western avenue and south of Torrance boulevard, then northwesterly across Torrance boulevard approximately 150 feet to an existing earth channel.

Supervisor Hahn's office pointed out that the project will eliminate the flooding of the intersection of Crenshaw and 190th street, which has posed a serious problem for many years, as well as provide increased flood control for a large portion of Torrance.

Plans for the project were prepared under the direction of Torrance City Engineer W. M. Nollac.

Polio Inoculation Program Will Be Conducted Here on August 16

Three properly spaced shots are needed for complete protection, with annual booster shots recommended.

March of Dimes officials declared that with the stepped-up inoculation program now underway, intervals between inoculations should be two weeks between the first two injections, with the third administered four weeks later.

They pointed out that the new oral Sabin vaccine will not be generally available in time to combat polio during the approaching polio season, but that there is no shortage of the effective Salk vaccine, developed through March of Dimes funds.

Dr. Martin F. Bain, chairman of the project, urged parents to protect children and themselves against paralytic polio before the high incidence season in late summer and early fall.

Last year children under ten years of age accounted for 60 per cent of all paralytic polio cases in Los Angeles County, it was pointed out.

Initiated as an anti-recession measure during the early months of 1961, the rearranging and expediting of proposed projects pushed County Road Department highway construction accomplishments to an all-time high. "This expanded level of construction activity," Supervisor Chace commented, "represented millions of dollars poured into the purchase of materials, including cement, rock, sand, steel, electrical fixtures, signs and other equipment."

This array of highway construction work comprised such varied projects as

bridge and roadway construction, grade separations and traffic signal and lighting installations. Public agencies cooperating with the County Road Department in achieving this augmented construction program to effectively integrate the County System of Highways, include the County Flood Control District, State Division of Highways, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the County Engineer, and the incorporated cities in the County.

"In meeting the highway problems created by our ever-growing population and the resulting increase in the number of motor vehicles on the County Highway System, County Road Commissioner N. H. Templin reports that plans for cash contract projects with a total estimated value exceeding \$12 million were completed during the 1960-61 fiscal year by the County Road Department," continued Supervisor Chace.

To aid the 71 cities of our County with their highway problems, the Board of Supervisors has allocated funds for road improvement projects and maintenance work within the corporate areas. This policy accounted for the commitment of almost \$13 million to provide financial assistance to the cities of our County from the Road Department's 1960-61 allotment of motor vehicle funds.
