RESOLUTION OF INTENTION RE TRANSFER OF WATER SYSTEM IN HAMMERTON TRACT TO THE DOMINGUEZ WATER CORPORATION.

WHEREAS, Title 6, Div. 1, Pt. 3, Ch. 2, Art. 9 of the Government Code authorizes the Board of Supervisors to sell and transfer title to improvements constructed or installed by a local agency with funds derived from special assessments; and

WHEREAS, a certain water distribution system was constructed and installed by the County of Los Angeles designated as "County Improvement No. 52" in the year 1926; and

WHEREAS, the Dominguez Water Corporation, 21714 South Alameda Street, Long Beach, California, has been supplying said water system since 1959 and has offered to rehabilitate the said system at its own expense if the County of Los Angeles will transfer title to said system to said corporation; and

WHEREAS, the Public Utilities Commission of this State has received complaints from water consumers using said system regarding the condition of said system; and

WHEREAS, the County Engineer has appraised the said system at a nominal value and has found said system to be in need of extensive repair and rehabilitation;

NOW, THEREFORE, it is resolved as follows:

(1) That it is the intention of this Board to find and determine that those certain improvements described herein are no longer useful for the purpose for which they were constructed and that said improvements cannot be economically or efficiently operated by the County of Los Angeles;

(2) That it is the intention of the Board to find that it would not be economical or in the public interest for any person, other than the Dominguez Water Corporation, to provide water to the said area, and that calling for bids upon the sale of said system would not result in competitive bids;

(3) That it is the intention of the Board to enter into an agreement for the sale of said system to the Dominguez Water Corporation, a public utility, in consideration of the agreement of said corporation to rehabilitate the said system;

(4) That it is the intention of the Board in these proceedings to lease to said Corporation a certain underground four-inch and two-inch cast-iron pipeline lying beneath the surface of Normandy Avenue and extending from 208th Street to a point approximately 141 feet north of 204th Street;

(5) That a public hearing shall be held on August 12, 1967, at the hour of 10:30 A.M. in the Hearing Room of the Board of Supervisors, Room 321 of the Board of Administration, 500 West Temple Street (corner Temple Street and Grand Avenue), Los Angeles 12, California, at which time and place any person objecting to the proposed sale and lease, or

either of them may appear and object thereto. Written protests must be delivered to the Clerk prior to the time set for the hearing. Copies of the proposed Agreement of Sale and Lease shall be on file with the Clerk of the Board of Supervisors not less than 10 days prior to said hearing.

(6) The water system proposed to be sold under these proceedings is located within that certain area known as the Hammerton Tract, in the County of Los Angeles, more particularly described as follows:

"Beginning at the Northwest corner of Lot B of Hammerton Tract, as shown on map recorded in Book 40, Page 2, 3, and 4 of Maps, Records of Los Angeles County, thence easterly in a direct line to the northeasterly corner of said lot; thence southerly in a direct line to the southeasterly corner of said lot; thence easterly along the easterly prolongation of the southerly line of said lot to a point in said easterly prolongation which is easterly thereon 150 feet from the easterly line of Normandy Avenue as shown on said map; thence southerly along the line which is parallel with the easterly line of said Normandy Avenue to a line which is parallel with and 150 feet north-easterly measured at right angles from the northerly line of East Road, as shown on map of Tract 6378, recorded in Book 68, Pages 1 and 2 of Maps, Records of said County; thence easterly along said last mentioned parallel line to the easterly line of Lot 47 of said last mentioned tract; thence southerly in a direct line to the southeasterly corner of said last mentioned lot; thence southerly along the easterly line of said last mentioned lot a distance of 150 feet; thence westerly along a line which is parallel with the easterly line of said last mentioned lot to the easterly line of Normandy Avenue, as shown on said last mentioned map; thence northerly in a direct line to the northwesterly corner of Lot 1 of said last mentioned tract; thence northerly in a direct line to the point of beginning."

California's Fish and Game Commission has approved 24 antlerless and either-sex deer hunts to be held in a total of 14 counties this fall. The Commission rejected 14 other proposed antlerless hunts. Meeting in Sacramento, the Commission approved issuance of a total of 10,665 permits to take deer in the special hunts. The permits will be issued by a statewide drawing.

To be eligible for the drawing for most of the hunts, sportsmen must apply on the official application blank attached to their 1961 deer tags. No money should be sent with the application. After the drawing, all successful applicants will be notified to send in \$5 for their permit.

DRAWINGS

For most of the hunts, applications must be received at the Department of Fish and Game, 722 Capitol Avenue, Sacramento, not later than 5 p.m. September 12. The drawing for these hunts will be held September 15. An exception is the Orange County hunt for which the application deadline is 5 p.m. August

8, with the drawing to be held that evening.

Of the 24 hunts approved, public drawings will be held for 20. Two of the remaining four will be on military reservations with a total of 425 permits. No permit is needed to participate in the Southern Los Angeles County Special Archery hunt in which not more than 200 deer may be taken. Permits totaling 150 for the San Emidio hunt in Kern County will be issued at the Bakersfield Fairgrounds on a first-come first-served basis starting at 8 a.m. on the mornings of August 19, August 26, September 2 and September 9. The San Emidio hunt permit fee is \$2 and the hunter must surrender the application attached to his
