Torrance Mobil Refinery Gets New Manager

Joe E. Penick has been appointed manager of the Torrance refinery of Mobil Oil Company, succeeding A. E. Thompson, who has been named manager of Mobil's refinery at Augusta, Kansas.

Penick had been manager of the Augusta refinery since 1959. He joined Mobil as a research assistant in 1942 and subsequently held research and engineering positions with Mobil at Dallas, Tex., Augusta and Paulsboro, N.J. He was operations supervisor at Mobil head-quarters in New York before being appointed manager of the company's refinery at East Providence, R.I., a post he held for two years before going to the Augusta refinery as manager. Penick is a graduate in chemical engineering from Oklahoma University.

Thompson has been manager of the Torrance refinery since 1949. He joined the company as a junior inspector in 1934 after being graduated as a chemical engineer from the California Institute of Technology. He was appointed senior chemical engineer in 1940, refinery engineer in 1943 and was assistant manager at Torrance from 1945 to 1949.

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
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
