DUROCHER TO METS
IF DODGERS WIN PENNANT

Not too many days ago George Weiss, General Manager of the New York Mets, was closeted, in secret session, with number two Dodger field boss Leo Durocher. Weiss' Mets are one of two major League teams expected to join the National League next year.

It doesn't take an astute baseball observer to guess what the conference was all about. Presumably they chatted about whether Leo is to stay with the Dodgers or if he is desirous of taking on the momentous task of producing a respectable team for Weiss and company with a handful of fading veterans and a dugout loaded with untried rookies.

According to Durocher the meeting never came off. After the purported conference Leo denied that Weiss' trip out to the West Coast was for his benefit. "Did we talk together?" "What's this about managing the Mets next year?" and "You must be nuts Mac!" were replies attributed to Leo when queried by newsmen.

In 1952 a scribe visiting with the Dodgers in spring training headquarters in Florida heard Walter O'Malley remark that in Buzzie Bavasi he (O'Malley) had one of the shrewdest General Managers in the business. Bavasi has earned the respect of many baseball traders since getting that vote of confidence from Walter. In acquiring Durocher early this year Bavasi reached a pinnacle baseball men usually fall far short of... he got the combined talents of Alston and Durocher to assure a what is now successful season.

Buzzie had another reason for hiring Leo, in fact two more. The Angels were moving into Gold Coast territory and he needed a man as colorful as Durocher to lure the "extra" fan into the Coliseum. In the event the Dodgers lost the pennant he could easily fire Alston as his excuse and replace him with Lorraine Day's ex stating that what the club lacked was a more take-charge kind of guy.

With less than a third of the season to go it looks like the Dodgers will take the top spot. Come Series time fans and writers alike will be singing the merits of one Leo Durocher for his fine job in assisting Walt Alston. Smokey will sign another contract and Leo will have to make up his mind. It's more likely that he will seek and get the field managers job in New York with a better salary figure. Leo has never been noted as a second fiddler.

HOUSTON BIDDING TOO

Once this summer former major league manager Bob Bragan, a coach for the Dodgers last year and now General Manager of Houston's entry in the National League, chatted with Durocher about the job in the Texas city. Sources close to Lippy stated bluntly that Leo wanted no part of the South. New York is his type of playground.

Unless the Reds can play 750 baseball from here on in to overtake the rampaging Dodgers it appears certain that Durocher will be calling the lineup for the New York Mets to his "friends," the umpires of the National League.
