Sculpture Show **To Begin Friday**

David Green, widely known Southern California artist, will present a one-man sculpture show at Pacific Ocean Park, beginning Friday August 18 through September 21.

Twenty-six of Green's works, in brass, steel, alabaster, ironwood, marble, mahogany, plaster, lead, granite and wood, will be displayed in P.O.P.'s Sea Lounge Gallery.

This marks the first time a one-man sculpture show has been featured at Pacific Ocean Park's Art Gallery.

Green, who began his career in 1930 in Chicago, now lives in Altadena. His work is in the permanent collections of the Los Angeles County Museum and the Pasadena Art Institute.

Born in Chicago, Green came to California in 1941, after study at the American Academy of Art and the National Academy, both in Chicago. He now teaches at Otis Art Institute.

Critics have said of Green that his animal structure displays a bold and sold decorative touch and true originality in outline and arrangement.

Theater Presents Summer Songfest

Nat King Cole is the kingpin in a brand-new, brilliant show engagingly titled "A Summer Songfest," that opens for six performances in the Greek Theater of Los Angeles at 8:30 Monday night, August 28, running through Saturday night, September 2.

The mellow - voiced monarch of song will display sevtral new facets of his talents, including comedy, in the novel production, scripted as a musical travelogue by Hollywood writer Les Pine and directed by David Alexander, who staged the Broadway musical "Pal Joey." Cole is set to sing in three languages, as well.

Supporting Cole is the beautiful young singer Barbara McNair, coming from the East to guest-star. Another feature is the vivacious Lee Scott group of dancers, while musical background is provided by the Greek Theater Orchestra under the skilled conducting of Nelson Riddle.

The Greek Theater season concludes Tuesday through Saturday nights, Sept. 5-19, with Sophocles' "Electra," given as it first was presented 2000 years ago in a traditional setting by the Greek Tragedy Theater, coming directly from Athens for the occasion. This will be the Thespians' first American ap-




Local Youngsters **Present Program Of Modern Dance**
