

County Opens Animal Shelter To Serve Western Sections

Lomita, Rolling Hills and Rolling Hills Estates are three local areas to be served by the county's newest animal shelter, 216 W. Victoria St., Gardena, it was announced by Supervisor Burton W. Chace recently.

The new shelter, set to serve the western and southwestern section of the county, will be under the direction of Willie J. DeMars, who was appointed by Poundmaster Marvin T. Thronson.

Five buildings in contemporary architecture, designed

to accommodate approximately 300 animals under sanitary conditions and in a humane manner at a minimum operating expense are included. The buildings are an office, utility building, two kennels and a shelter for large animals.

The shelter is open to the public for the redemption and purchase of animals from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday. However, animals may be brought to the shelter any time between 7 a.m. and midnight. Employees are on duty 24 hours a day, seven days per week, in order to provide full coverage for the handling of regular and emergency calls.

Fourteen employees will be assigned to this new facility to perform office, field patrol and kennel duties.

Area Storm Drain Contract Awarded

Award of a contract by the Board of Supervisors covering storm drain construction in the Welteria-Torrance area to M and J Construction Co. and Vinson Construction Company of La Canada, a joint venture, was announced today by Supervisor Burton Chace.

M. E. Salisbury, chief engineer of the County Flood Control District, recommended the action on the basis of a low bid of \$1,015,793.50 filed by the firms on August 11.

The project involves the construction of concrete box and pipe conduits plus supporting fixtures, Chace said. About 11 months will be required to complete construction.

Cost of the work will be paid from the \$225,000,000 Storm Drain Bond Issue which won voter approval in 1958.

In answer to complaints of Torrance residents that fall-out shelters recommended by the national office of Civil Defense are not "good enough" for the community, the Torrance Civil Defense and Disaster Commission recently said these fall-out shelters do not conform to requirements of the Building Code because of earthquake possibilities.

City Manager Wade E. Peoples said the building division is now developing a plan which would comply with local requirements and provide protection at an approximate cost of \$500.

John A. Bramhall, assistant city manager, said another problem involved is the location of a fall-out shelter and the height of the mound which would necessarily be caused by the half-buried type now being considered.

Consideration and study by the Planning Commission and action by the City Council must be taken before any plan is approved however, Bramhall said.

Dr. Furbay, internationally known lecturer, author and world air commuter, has directed the global education program of T.W.A. on four continents for years and was a recent recipient of the Brewer Trophy, aviation's "oscar" for outstanding service in advancing air-age concepts. He has come to be known as one of America's most dynamic and inspirational interpreters of the international scene, said L. R. Albrow of Torrance schools.

Dr. Furbay is associated with many leading organizations which are helping to create a more active awareness of the forces at play in the world of today. He has recently returned from several international conferences abroad and is a regular lecturer of the staff of the World Seminar of Education in Geneva, Switzerland, and of the Strategic Intelligence School, Washington, D. C.

A fellow of the Royal Geo-

graphic Society, of London, the Royal Anthropological Society, and the National Geographic Society, Dr. Furbay spent several years as senior specialist in the United States Office of Education and as educational attaché in the U.S. Embassies of Costa Rica and Colombia. For three years, while educational consultant to the Republic of Liberia, he served as president of the College of West Africa.

During World War II, Dr. Furbay, who is also "Colonel Furbay," carried out special assignments for the War Department related to the invasion and occupation of Africa.

Dr. Furbay was an official delegate and reporter to the first Pan-American Conference on Cultural Cooperation at Havana, Cuba, and served as aviation's observer on the U. S. Delegation to UNESCO (United Nations Educational,

Scientific, and Cultural Organization) in Mexico City, Beirut, Paris and Florence.

Dr. Furbay's many years carrying out cultural, diplomatic, and commercial missions all over the globe have given him a deep insight into our present world, its problems, and its boundless possibilities, Albrow said.

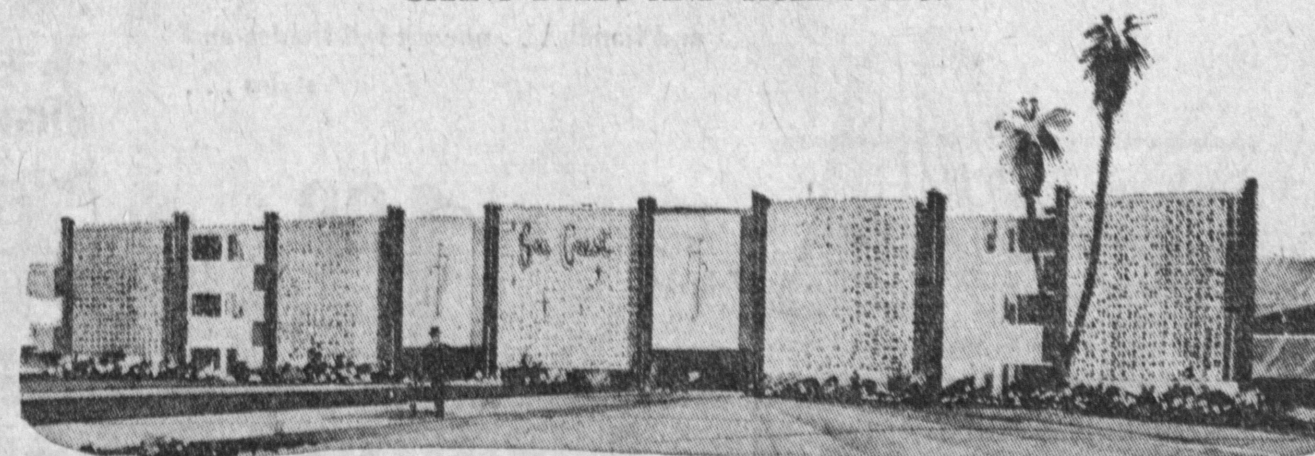
