Hospitals Repeat 'Polio Clinics'

"Polio clinics" will be repeated at five greater South Bay community hospitals Thursday, August 31, for persons who need polio booster inoculations, or who wish to begin or continue a polio inoculation series.

Five hospitals involved will offer the inoculations Thursday from 4 through 8 p.m. at a nominal charge of \$1, medical spokesmen said.

The program is under auspices of Southwest District of Los Angeles County Medical Association. The Southwest District of LACMA will make physicians available during the designated hours.

Hospitals will provide space, equipment, nursing personnel, and serum. Auxiliary and volunteer units will provide secretarial aid and

other assistance which may be necessary, according to Dr. William A. Taylor, president of the local district medical organization.

Dr. Taylor also said clinics will be repeated at hospitals as a public service on the last Thursday of each month for an indefinite period.

The first such clinic was held May 25.

Chemist Finds Compound

Jack C. Hileman, El Camino College chemistry instructor, recently synthesized the compound technetium carbonyl, which is the last missing member of the manganese sub-groups carbonyls.

Hileman, currently on leave from El Camino College, is engaged in graduate studies in chemistry at the University of California at Los Angeles. His leave is supported by a National Science Foundation Science Faculty Fellowship.

The chemistry instructor prepared the new technetium compound under the direction of Dr. Herbert D. Kaesz, UCLA chemistry department, and was assisted by fellow graduate student, Dale K. Huggins.

News Spotlights Work

The journal of American Chemical Society reported Hileman's work and was placed in the national scientific news spotlight when reported in the Chemical and Engineering News. Hileman will present a paper to the Division of Inorganic Chemistry of the American Chemical Society on Friday, Sept. 8, as a part of the 140th national meeting of the ACS, in Chicago.

During Hileman's year at UCLA he has been appointed visiting scholar and elected to Phi Lambda Upsilon, honorary chemistry fraternity. He will continue his graduate studies on a sabbatical leave next year at the University of the Pacific where he will participate in a program of new teaching methods of college chemistry developed by Dr. Cobb of Stockton College.

Work Continues

During his work at UOP, Hileman will continue his investigations in inorganic chemistry in cooperation with Dr. Frye of the Pacific chemistry faculty.

Hileman has been a member of the El Camino College faculty for 11 years and is a graduate of Ventura Junior College. He received his Bachelor's degree from the University of California and his Master's from the University of Southern California.

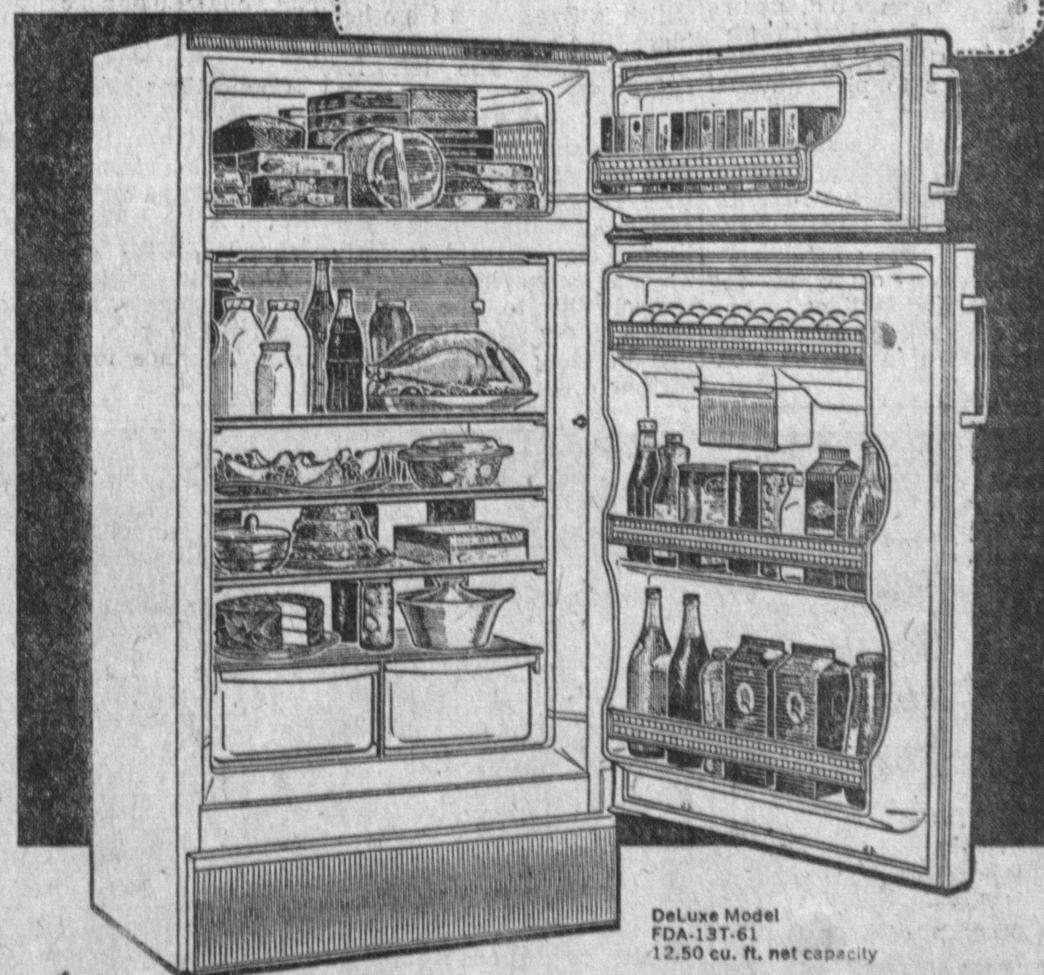
