

Catholic Group Plans Program For Labor Day

Two events will highlight Labor Day in Southern California, Monday, Sept. 4: the celebration of Solemn High Mass at 8:30 a.m. in St. Vibiana's Cathedral and a 10 a.m. breakfast in the Pacific Ballroom of the Statler-Hilton Hotel. These two events, sponsored by the Catholic Labor Institute, mark the 15th consecutive year of sponsorship by the Los Angeles group.

More than 1,000 men and women and their families, members of organized labor and their friends, will open the day with prayer and devotion in old St. Vibiana's Cathedral, Second and Main streets.

The highlight of the breakfast meeting will be the 1961 Father Coogan Labor-Management Award, which was designed to be shared jointly by the units of organized labor and management. The basis of award determination was this:—it was to be given to a company and a union who have, by cooperative effort, achieved a measure of industrial peace; who have contributed to the attainment of social justice, and who have put into practice the principles of Christian social teaching.

John B. Geagan, president of the Catholic Labor Institute, heads the sponsoring committee for the "Salute to Labor" program, which will be composed of outstanding men and women of the labor movement. Thomas Consiglio, legislative education co-ordinator for District 38, United Steelworkers of America, AFL-CIO, is Labor Day chairman. The public is invited, according to Geagan, to attend both the Mass and breakfast.
