# Infant Dies as Truck Backs Down Drive

## Parents Hospitalized After Baby's Death

A one-year old infant toddled into the driveway of the family home Friday morning and was killed instantly when her father backed a pickup truck out of the garage.

Pronounced dead on arrival at Little Company of Mary Hospital was Erin Kathleen McLaughlin, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William E. McLaughlin, 21829 Barbara St.

Accident occurred early in the morning as McLaughlin, a general contrac-

tor was preparing to leave home for work.

### OUT TO PLAY

The youngster had wandered out of the house to play in the front yard. As she wandered across the driveway McLaughlin backed the car toward the street and the right rear wheel passed over the child.

Both the mother and father of the youngster were taken to Little Company of Mary Hospital in shock and placed under sedation.

two other children, Michael, 5, and Sean; 2½.

Torrance police officials investigating the case said that they did not consider it a traffic accident as it happened on private property.

Pointing out that the city has had no traffic accident fatalities over a Labor Day weekend in more than ten years, they said that the child's death, however, is the sixth fatality caused by an automobile in Torrance this year.

## Final Decision Tuesday On Marble Estate Issue

## Two Youngsters Dead; Hospitalized Mother Held On Murder Charges

A Redondo Beach mother of two children, who were found dead in the family home at 1508 Stanford St., is being held in South Bay General Hospital on suspicion of murder.

Mrs. Ruth Ann Jensen, 42, a registered nurse, was discovered lying on a bed in a semi-conscious state, and hospital physicians list her condition as critical.

Bodies of the two youngsters Clark Robert, 5, and Raymond Roy, 3, were found on a davenport in the front room.

Discovery of the victims was made by baby sitter Mable Alice Lane, 49, of Redondo Beach, and relatives of the family.

Investigating officers said

the woman, who was employed at Harbor General Hospital, was married and that her husband, Robert Lawrence Jensen, has been ill and confined to a hospital.

They said that the two youngsters had apparently been smothered although puncture marks, indicating the use of a hypodermic needle, had been found on the buttocks of both.

## Torrance Youth Dead In NY Crash

A 19-year old graduate of South High School was reported killed in an auto accident last week near Geneva, New York.

Army Pvt. Roderick Antrim, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. Roderick E. Antrim, 229 Camino de las Colinas, was killed when the vehicle in which he was riding crashed into the back of a stalled truck. Another soldier, Pfc. Gerald Brady, 20, of Pennsylvania, was also killed in the crash.

Body of the youth was returned here Friday and funeral services will be held next week.

## Allocate Funds For Catalina St. Improvements

Allocation of \$9,650 for the improvement of Catalina St. from 204th to 208th Streets, Torrance, was announced last week by County authorities.

"Work will be scheduled by the Los Angeles County Road Department pending completion of other portions of the current work load. The project will consist of reconstructing the existing pavement and extending the pavement to join the recently constructed curb and gutter by the County Road Department in conjunction with property owners," Supervisor Burton W. Chace said. "It will improve area drainage, decrease present maintenance costs, and provide smoother roadway riding quality."

# Torrance Man Wins Own 'Business'

## Selected From 3,000 Contestants Entered In Nationwide Competition

One lucky Torrance man unexpectedly became the owner of his own business this week after his name was selected from among several thousand competitors.

Bill Steimer, Jr., of 20921 Tomlee St., became the winner of a pre-fabricated miniature golf course in a country-wide competition.

## Officers Expect Rash Of Weekend Speeders

In a nation beset by Labor Day Weekend accidents and fatalities the city of Torrance stands out.

This community has not had one traffic fatality over this inordinately fatal weekend in the past ten years.

But this is a record made to be broken, and no one knows it better than local traffic law enforcement officers.

A full contingent of officers will be patrolling Torrance streets on the lookout for violators of speed and safety regulations. They know that the only way to maintain this city as an oasis of safety is the rigid enforcement of all regulations.

### GROWING LISTS

From areas outside this city newspaper, radio and television reports of traffic casualties are once again starting to grow.

Torrance police officials this week released a list of ten "Traffic Commandments" which, if observed, will be bound to save lives.

Listed in order, they are:  
DON'T SPEED, observe all speed limit signs; CONCENTRATE, be ready for the unexpected; DON'T CROWD, rear-end collisions are the number one cause of auto accidents in the U.S.; KEEP AN EYE ON THE CAR BEHIND YOU, he may be crowding too close behind you; DRIVE DEFENSIVELY, be prepared for a mistake on the other driver's part; DON'T DRINK AND DRIVE, no explanation is necessary; USE SEAT BELTS, majority of traffic accident injuries could be prevented with their use; PARK OFF THE ROAD, get as far off the right of way as possible; KEEP YOUR DOORS LOCKED, locked doors do not readily spring open during a collision throwing occupants of the vehicle into the street; and BE COURTEOUS, make motoring a pleasure to others as well as yourself.
