New Hotel-Restaurant Head Has Midwestern Background

Neil R. Messick, one of the nation's leading hotel executives and former director of the American Hotel Association, has been appointed vice-president and general manager of the Pen & Quill Hotel, which is now under construction in Manhattan Beach, Calif., it was announced by Bob Reuben, president of the corporation. He has already joined the

new organization, occupying temporary offices in the Pen & Quill Restaurant, which the hotel will adjoin when it opens in November. The 200-room business-resort hotel, offering the most modern conveniences and service facilities, is being built near the Los Angeles International Airport at a cost of approximately \$2 million.

Messick, who is also a past president of the Minneapolis and Minnesota Hotel Associations, comes to Southern California from the Midwest, where he was executive vice-president and general manager of the Hotel Nicollet in Minneapolis for 20 years.

He was previously associated with the Late Ralph Hitz and his National Hotel Management Company, managing its properties from 1931 until the company dissolved in 1940. They included the Ritz Carlton in Atlantic City, N.J., the New Yorker in New York City and the Nicollet in Minneapolis.

Messick, now residing in Pacific Palisades, also figured prominently in Midwestern civic, fraternal and cultural activities. He has long been active in campaigns in behalf of the Red Cross, National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the Heart Association, Crusade for Freedom and other welfare organizations. He was also the founder of the Minneapolis Aquatennial.

In becoming a hotel official in Southern California, Messick said the Pen & Quill Hotel will rank among the outstanding luxury hotels in the West, second to none.

"Judging from my many years of hotel management," he stated, "I believe our deluxe rooms and magnificent
