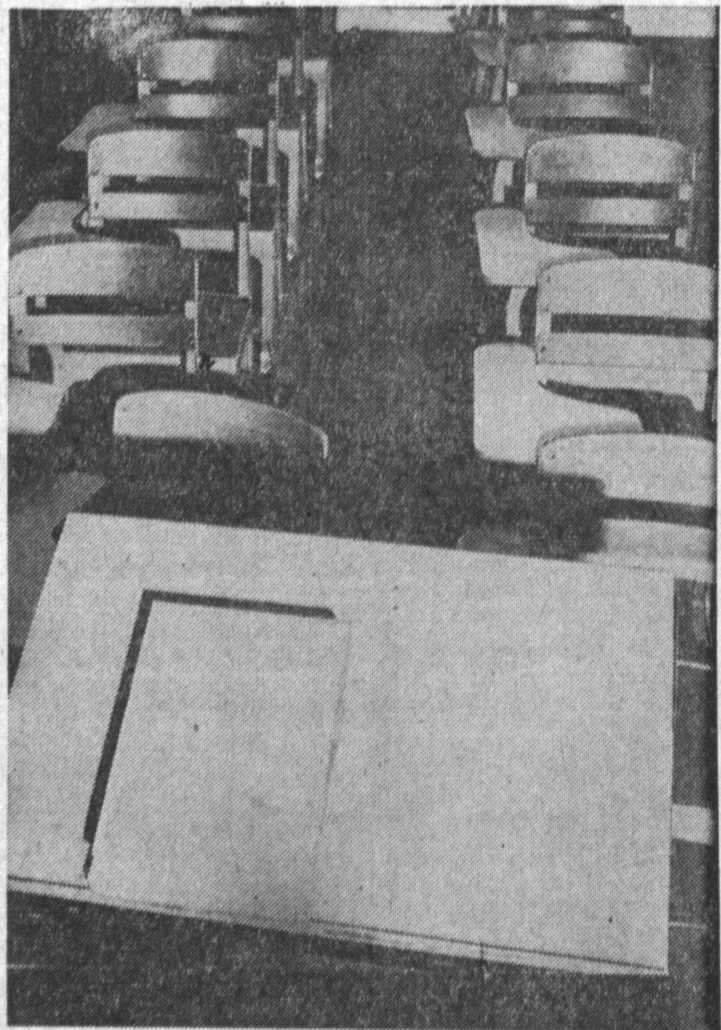

In Los Angeles County, only seven school districts returned to school prior to Monday. Three districts don't open until later in the week.

Statistically speaking, approximately 1,487,710 were enrolled in some form of educational activity as of March 31, 1961. This number is expected to be about 4 percent higher this fall, according to Dr. C. C. Trillingham, Los Angeles County superintendent of schools.

Mom, if your children attend kindergarten through eighth grade, they are among more than 892,000 students in the county in these grades. If they are in high school, they are among 274,200 students. There are more than 4,016,000 students in California.

The Los Angeles County enrollment accounts for more students than total enrollment in individual states including California, Illinois, Michigan, New York, Ohio, Pennsylvania and Texas.
