## Metro Conference Coaches Capture Top Grid Talent

Veteran coach Clyde Johnson has captured some of the fastest and most talented Southern League backfield stars for East Los Angeles College this season and if the Huskies can solve their line and quarterback problems, the school may have one of the most dangerous running games in the conference. This despite the loss of All-Metro halfback Anthony Lorick.

Newcomers include Olvin Moreland, whose breakaway running pace Los Angeles to the city finals, and Manual Arts' Isaiah White. Both were All-ICity. Teamed up with returnees Jerry Cohill and Vern Shepherd, these two figure to impose a stiff penalty on defenses.

Now Johnson is sifting his 75 candidates to find a quarterback to fuse the attack, and replace two-year vet Frank Gomez. Most likely to succeed is Wayne Healy of Marshall. When the Huskies, who had a 5-4 record last year using the multiple offense, go into the singling, tailback will be tiny Frank Alderette, a deadly long passer.

### RETURNEES

On the line, guard Brad Ohm, 1960 starter, is back with tackle John Bilderback and end Lewis Hood. Additional help comes from end Bill Dickey and tackle Ross Hernandez, 1959 lettermen. Newcomers include South Gate's Dennis Evenson (center) and John Cousimano (tackle). Evenson was all-city.

All Marine League guard Tony Perkov of San Pedro also fits in with Johnson's line rebuilding plans.

Adding to the Huskies' backfield depth are another quartet of 1960 city prep standouts—halfbacks Tommy Gaines (Jordan), halfback Tony (The Bomb) Boschetti (Huntington Park), halfback Fred Lohr (South Gate) and fullback Rex Stewart (Dorsey). Acquisition of two prize ends may give the Huskies a "shotgun" offense engineered by Alderette. Besides Dickey and Hood, Alderette's targets will be Jordan's Lawrence Mills and Manual's Russ Saunders, both All-City ends. The Huskies open at LACC next Friday afternoon.
