## Inside Your Home

Your Decorating Problems Answered

Mr. Wallace:

I have an entry hall about eight feet long that I would like to put a large horizontal mirror on one side. Do you think this would be allowable?

If you have an eight foot free wall with out doors interrupting this wall try taking a four foot wide area and clear up to the ceiling with a vertical line mirror rather than a horizontal. In my opinion this treatment would be far more effective and would give the illusion that the entry hall is much larger than it really looks.

Mr. Wallace:

I have noticed that many of the new tract homes that are being built have just one color through out the house. Is this done for a specific reason or just to save on painting costs. Would you please clarify?

Mrs. Sames:

Speaking generally this method of interior painting is used to give a feeling of continuity throughout the entire

house, in other words not chopping up the house with different colors as to cause a definite sharp contrast between rooms. I might add I agree with this in principle only. I personally prefer to slightly color shade from room to room, keeping in mind the feeling of continuity, for example beige to natural or grey to grieger.

Here are some decorating tips on furniture arrangement:

1. Furniture should always be arranged with the purpose of the room uppermost in thought.

2. Individual pieces should be placed so that they are convenient, their use is obvious and they are not interfered with by other pieces.

3. The quantity of furniture should not give the effect of either under furnishing or over crowding.

4. If the plan permits opposite walls should have similar groupings or at least they should appear evenly balanced in quantity and interest.

5. Pieces should be distributed for non-interference of circulation. Door openings and passageways should be kept free of obstruction.

6. Furniture placed with lines parallel to the walls creates greater unity than when placed in diagonal positions.
