

Community Chest Trailer Tours Torrance Oct. 16

A tractor-drawn trailer, designed to offer Community Chest agency literature and displays at several locations in the harbor area during the forthcoming campaign, starts its tour Oct. 3 of other Los Angeles areas. It will arrive in the harbor area for a four-day tour starting Oct. 16.

Mayor Sam Yorty and leading campaign volunteers will participate in a launching ceremony at 10 a. m. from the Los Angeles city hall.

This was announced recently by Albert Ralph Jr., vice-president of Ralphs Grocery Co. and chairman of the Chest project.

Called a "helpmobile" because it will dispense free helpful hint leaflets prepared by Chest agencies, the educational unit is being built on a 40-ft. trailer contributed by Ralphs.

Disney, it will feature his cartoon characters on its exterior decoration.

General Motors Corp. will contribute the truck cab to mope the unit; designer Steve Madden, Lockheed Aircraft Corp., and Barbara Brothers are working together on the interior exhibits, according to Ralphs.

Following the Oct. 3 ceremony, the Helpmobile will be spotted in shopping centers and other locations for convenience of visitors.

At each location volunteers will serve as hostesses.

Admission is free and no solicitation will be made at the unit.

Visitors may view exhibits showing the work of Chest agencies and obtain leaflets on such topics as poison prevention, dental care and guides to health and welfare agencies.

307,000 VOLUMES . . .

Begin Delivery of New Telephone Books Monday

The new October 1961 Southern Section telephone directories were delivered to local subscribers starting Monday, R. S. Pyle, Pacific Telephone's Torrance manager, announced today.

The 1132-page alphabetical edition with a combined local classified section will have an approximate initial distribution of 307,000 in the southern area. Another 144,000 copies of the directory will be sent to other parts of Los Angeles and other national and world cities.

"Some parallel to local growth might be drawn from the new edition," Pyle pointed out, "for the alphabetical section has grown by some 11,000 listings over last year's total."

Some new style telephone numbers appear in the Southern Section directory for the first time this year. These numbers, part of the nation-

wide All-Number-Calling (ANC) plan, have dropped the familiar two-letter prefix in favor of an all-number designation.

For example, Pacific Telephone's Torrance business office phone is now listed as 328-1101. The introductory pages contain a brief explanation of ANC as well as informational maps for dialing across the Los Angeles extended area, and a list of area codes for Direct Distance Dialing throughout the nation.

Completion of the delivery is expected within the week, Pyle said.

Community Hospitals to Schedule Polio Clinics

"Polio clinics" will be repeated at five greater South Bay community hospitals Thursday, Sept. 28, for persons who need polio booster inoculations or who wish to begin or continue a polio inoculation series.

Five hospitals involved will offer the inoculations Thursday from 4 through 8 p.m. at a charge of \$1 medical spokesmen said.

The program is under auspices of Southwest District of Los Angeles County Medical Association. The Southwest district of LACMA will make physicians available during the designated hours.

Hospitals will provide space, equipment, nursing personnel, and serum. Auxiliary and volunteer units will

provide secretarial aid and other assistance which may be necessary, according to Dr. William A. Taylor, president of the local district medical organization.

Dr. Taylor also said clinics will be repeated at hospitals as a public service on the last Thursday of each month for an indefinite period.

Peninsula Road Projects

An extensive roadway pavement sealing project in the Palos Verdes Peninsula area has been scheduled by the Los Angeles County Road Department to begin this week, according to Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

The following segments of roadways comprising over a million square feet of surface will be sealed:

Crenshaw Blvd. from Palos Verdes Drive North to Crest Road; Palos Verdes Drive West from Palos Verdes Dr. South to the City of Palos

Verdes Estates boundary; Palos Verdes Drive South between Narcissa Drive and Palos Verdes Drive West; and Crest Road from Hawthorne to Crenshaw Blvds.

Supervisor Chace pointed out that the completed project will prolong the usefulness of the existing pavements, as well as decrease roadway maintenance costs on these portions of County Master Plan major highways.

He asked motorists to drive carefully in the construction zones during progress of the work.

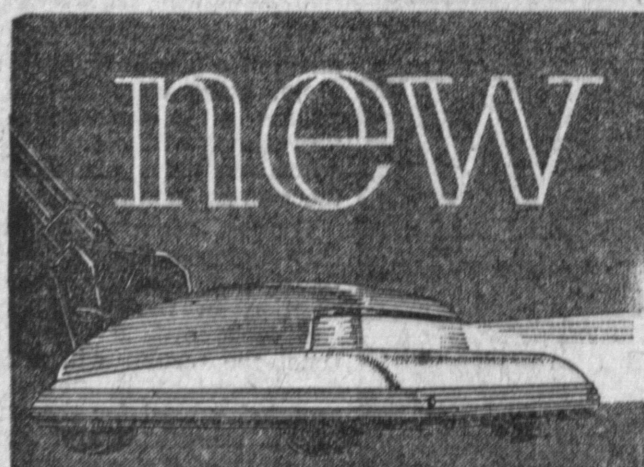
