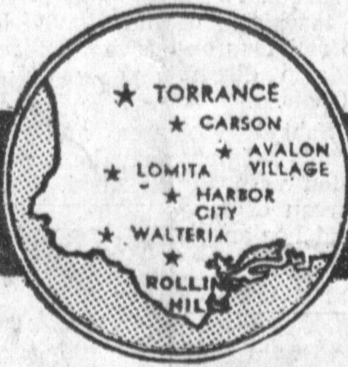

Masked Bandits Rob Liquor Store Clerk

Make Escape With Receipts

Two masked and gloved bandits, who had to ask instructions on how to open the cash register, robbed a Torrance liquor store clerk early yesterday morning.

The duo, who were armed with a six-inch blue steel revolver and whose faces were masked with black handkerchiefs, held up clerk Jerry Lane at the Trading Post Liquor Store, 20317 Hawthorne Blvd. shortly before the shop closed.

Lane, 40, of 21123 So. Harvard St., told Torrance detectives that the two entered the shop and, while one of the suspects pointed the gun at him, the other came behind the counter to clean out the register.

INSTRUCTION

Unable to open the till the gunmen forced Lane to show them how.

The clerk described the two suspects as both being about 5'8", one about 30 years of age, the other about 45, one wearing a gray, the other a tan jacket.

When the pair entered the store they announced, "This

is a holdup. Stand back or we'll shoot."

After gathering an estimated \$600 from the till the two bandits warned Lane, "Don't follow us or we'll blow your brains out."

They made their escape southbound on Hawthorne in a white 1952 or 1953 Ford sedan.

Liquor store has a long history of holdups, Torrance investigators said.

Shortly after the formation of the Torrance Police Department's felony unit, two detectives, Sam Piazza and Don Cook, who were cruising past the store, saw two bandits in the act of holding it up. They waited outside and made the arrest as the bandits came out.

Commission to Recommend Airport Expansion Plan

Torrance Airport commissioners this week recommended that the city give a go-ahead to a three step plan to develop the local air terminus.

First step in the procedure would be the sale of some \$600,000 in revenue bonds to finance the venture, commissioners stated. They will recommend that the council approve the sale of bonds.

Revenue bonds are repaid from income of the airport, itself, manager Jack Egan stated.

Although nearly \$1,000,000 would be required to finish

the first phase of the development program, the federal government will pick up nearly \$400,000 of the expense, Egan said.

First phase of the development would involve extension of the runway.
