Stricken Coach Scheduled to Return to Area

Coach Norm Verry, El Camino College grid mentor, was expected to return to the Southland by air-ambulance yesterday following a week's hospitalization in Reno, Nev., where he was stricken by a brain hemorrhage Saturday.

Originally scheduled to return Thursday, the popular grid mentor was held at Washo Medical center in Reno following a slight increase in temperature, the result of a slight throat irritation and sinus congestion. Following antibiotic treatment, he is expected to be able to make the morning flight to Los Angeles.

Doctors in the Nevada medical center emphasized that Verry is showing continued progress and that no further evidence of difficulty has arisen following the brain hemorrhage.

CONTINUED CARE

On his return to the Southland, Verry will be taken to St. Vincent's hospital, Los Angeles, where he will be placed under the care of Dr. Theodore Kurza, neurosurgeon affiliated with the University of Southern California. A series of diagnostic tests will be administered at the hospital for further study. Testing will probably begin early next week.

Dr. Charles Flemming, Reno neurosurgeon, predicted that the coach will be confined to St. Vincent's Hospital for a minimum of one week. Results of diagnosis there will govern the exact period of hospitalization.

Dr. Flemming noted that the coach is fully rational and that his recovery has progressed very well.

Pass Defense, Ground Gaining Keep Panthers In Own Backyard

South High School's mighty eleven Friday night trounced the vaunted Long Beach Jordan Panthers 19-0 in a series of ground gaining drives that kept Jordan contained in its own backyard throughout the evening.

Paydirt for the Spartans was hit in the first quarter when Halfback Dave Garrison drove six yards through the line for the first score. In the same period Phil Fish upped the ante to 13-0.

Last tally of the game was brought in during the final

period by halfback Harvey Siegel on a line plunge.

Tremendous showing of South's gridders Friday night should make them early favorites to bring home the Bay League title.

Dorresteyn Heads Motorcycle Card At Tonight's Meet

Dick Dorresteyn of upstate San Pablo, No. 1 ranked TT rider in the United States, takes on a strong field of two-wheelers Sunday night (Oct. 1) at Ascot Park, Gardena, in quest of his seventh steeplechase victory of the season.

The 15-event AMA-sanctioned program around the trick seven-turn course, with a hair-raising jump thrown in, begins at 8:30 p.m., qualifying and practice laps at 7.

Dick Hammer of Lakewood, winner of four events and No. 2 nationally ranked rider, is expected to provide Dorresteyn with bristling competition not to mention the likes of Jack O'Brien, Clark White, Dave Bostrum, Jack Simmons, Jim Goldsmith, Chuck Minert and other AMA stars.

In the last steeplechase at Ascot Sept. 3, Dorresteyn lowered Hammer's 15-lap record to 12:25.25 as well as setting one and four lap records.

El Camino College hosted the fifth annual countywide clinic of the Wrestling Coaches and Officials Association yesterday.

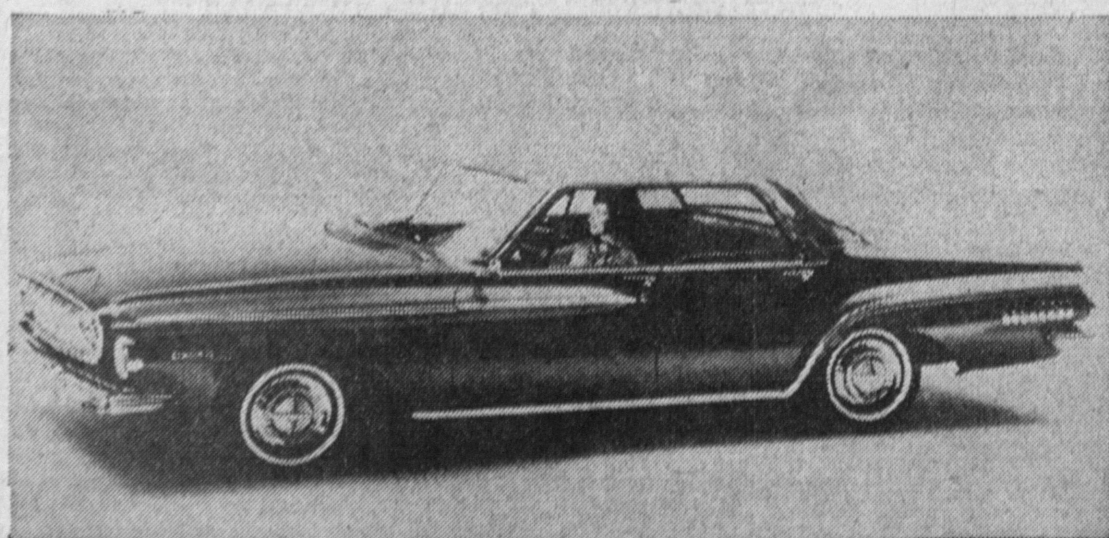
The clinic attracted 40 to 50 high school and college wrestling coaches meeting to improve and standardize officiating of wrestling in California.
