

Lions Club Begins White Cane Drive

Chuck Turner, president of the Hawthorne Lions Club, today announced the appointment of two local optometrists, Drs. Howard Preston and Dale Freeberg, as co-chairmen of the Hawthorne Lions White Cane Drive for October. Donations raised from this drive will be used to aid sightless children and adults in Hawthorne.

Bob Anderson and John O'Leary have joined teaching forces and are devoting their time to teaching sightless children to bowl. Every Saturday morning at the Tropicana Lanes, Prairie Ave. in Hawthorne, this activity is in full swing.

Anderson is also in charge of a Physical Fitness Program for blind children, and Shaw's Gym at the corner of Rosecrans and Inglewood Ave. in Hawthorne is the scene of boxing matches through sense of touch, as well as a calisthenics program for those who cannot see.

"Save Your Sight" Day is Oct. 21, and free eye examinations will be given on this date at the Hawthorne City Hall, 200 W. 126th St., Hawthorne, through a combined program of local optometrists. Testing equipment will be used to detect eye defects.

Approximately \$10,000 has been spent to date in the Hawthorne area alone for glasses for needy children, recreation and treatment of blind children and adults, as well as special equipment for the blind.

Employment Unit Designs Symbol For Local Offices

A new metal sign bearing a symbol identifying the local employment service with more than 1,800 other offices as part of a nationwide public employment service was installed at the Torrance public employment office Sept. 28, Murray Love, local manager, California State Employment Service announced.

The Torrance employment office is one of 100 local offices of the California State Employment Service.

The symbol features silhouettes of a man and woman entering a doorway of a local office. It bears the legend "Public Employment Service" at the top and the words "Service for Everyone — Local-State-National" at the bottom.

Love interpreted the symbol as signifying the door of opportunity — a door open to all people seeking suitable job opportunities and to all employers seeking qualified workers.

"A major purpose of the new symbol is to build up goodwill for the public employment service," Love said. "We hope the new symbol will become associated in the public mind with good and useful services."

The public employment service was created by the Wagner-Peyser Act of 1933.

This act directed the U.S. Labor Department to create the United States Employment Service and to establish and maintain a nationwide system of State-administered State and territorial employment services which would provide placement and other services to workers, employers, and the public.

System includes employment services in the fifty States, the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, the Virgin Islands, and Guam.

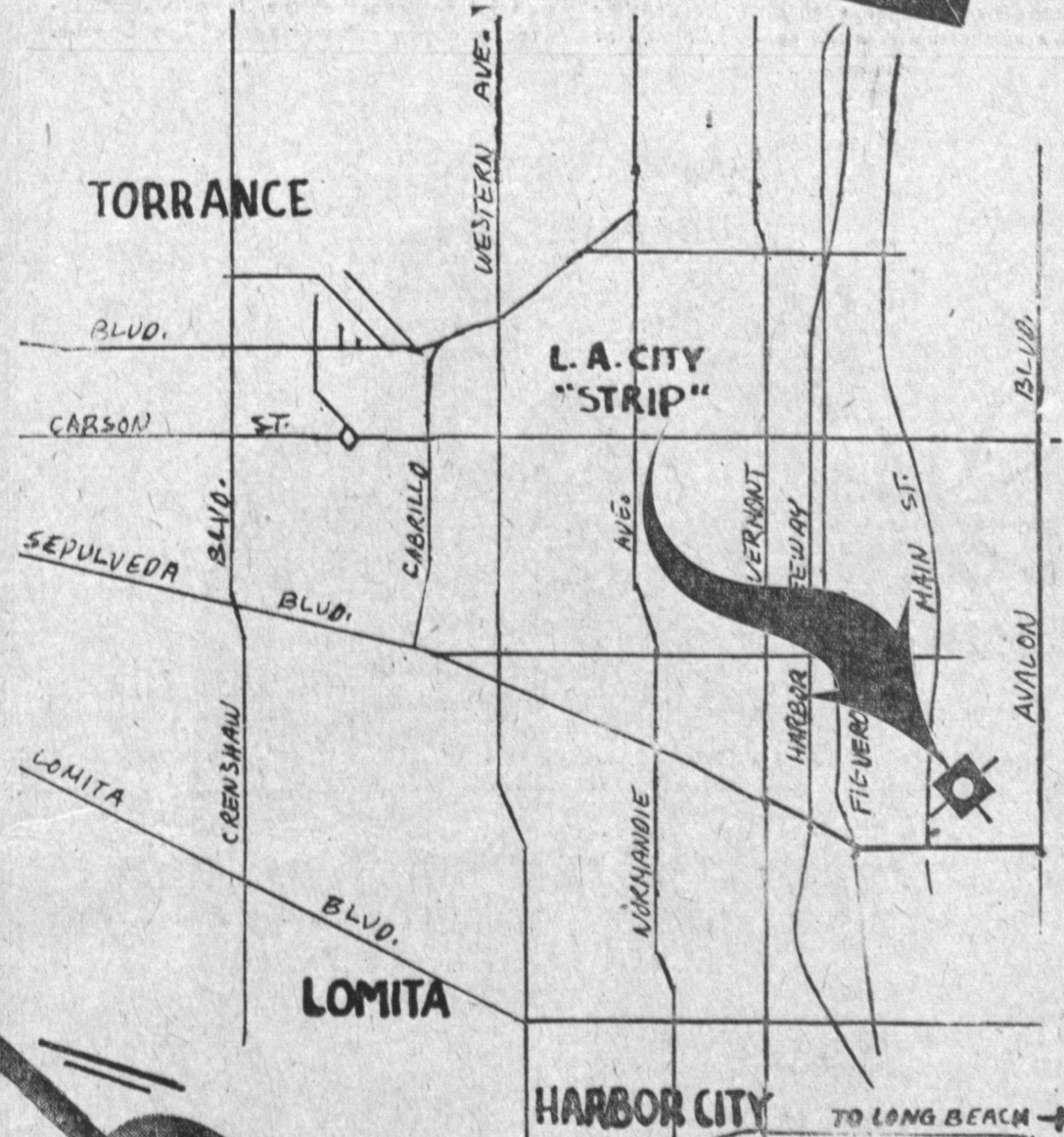
