Mrs. Hooper will discuss various issues from the viewpoint of the Africans themselves, their desire for social and economic improvement and their plans for fulfilling these desires. She will answer such questions as "How do the Africans feel about colonialism, nationalism, cold war entanglements, and the United Nations? Where does Africa stand ideologically in the conflict between Democracy and Communism? What do they expect of the United States, of the Soviet Union, and of their own people? What can we as educated women do to assist in bringing about better understanding between the United States and Africa?"

Mrs. Hooper is the only white person ever to work inside the African National Congress, major political organization of black South Africa.
