'Overland Trail' Series Stars Bendix, McClure

A new slant on the "winning of the West" will be provided viewers every Saturday, starting this week, at 8:30 p.m. when "Overland Trail" premieres on KTTV, Channel Eleven.

William Bendix stars as Kelly, superintendent of a newly formed stage line, in the full-hour western adventure series, which also features Doug McClure as "Flip" Flippin, Kelly's trouble-shooting sidekick.

The series tells the story of the battle to clear a stagecoach route from Missouri to California through country infested with renegades and wild Indian tribes.

Although Bendix and McClure are the continuing stars in the dramatic series, top-name stars appear every week.

Bendix has appeared in more than 50 Hollywood films including "Lifeboat" and "The Babe Ruth Story." He is well known to TV fans because of his performance in the title role of "The Life of Riley" for five years. In addition he has starred in numerous dramatic and special telecasts.

McClure has appeared on the screen in "The Enemy Below" and "Gidget." On TV, he has been seen on many programs.

"Overland Trail" provides a new approach to life in the Old West. Here are two men, embarking on a new venture—a stagecoach route to California—and determined to make a success of it despite the obstacles. 23 Pro-Basketball Games Televised Over NBC Beginning This Saturday

Twenty-three professional basketball games will be televised nationally by NBC-TV Network on Saturday afternoons during the 1961-62 season starting this Saturday, according to the schedule of TV contests announced by Maurice Podoloff, president of the National Basketball Association, and Tom S. Gallery, NBC Sports Director.

Gallery also announced that sportscaster Bud Palmer would be the court-side commentator for the basketball games. Palmer was an All-American basketball player at Princeton and starred in pro ranks with the New York Knickerbockers.

This will be the eighth straight year that NBC-TV is televising pro basketball. The 23-game TV slate includes 18 regular-season contests, four playoff tilts and a pre-season exhibition this Saturday.

In the opener, the St. Louis Hawks, champions of the Western Division of the NBA last year, play the Cincinnati Royals, led by last season's "Rookie of the Year," Oscar "Big O" Robertson, at Cincinnati Gardens.

The first regular-season game to be televised will have the Philadelphia Warriors, with Wilt "The Stilt" Chamberlain, playing host to the New York Knickerbockers Oct. 21, at Convention Hall.

The weekly basketball series will skip three Saturdays during the season—Dec. 16, Dec. 30 and Jan. 6—when NBC-TV will televise football games. TV time for almost all of the games will be 10:30 or 11:30 a.m. PT, 1:30 p.m. CT.

The NBA launches its 16th year of operation with one

new team, the Chicago Packers. The first TV contest for the newly formed club will be Nov. 11, against Cincinnati. The league now has nine teams, five in the Western Division and four in the Eastern Division.

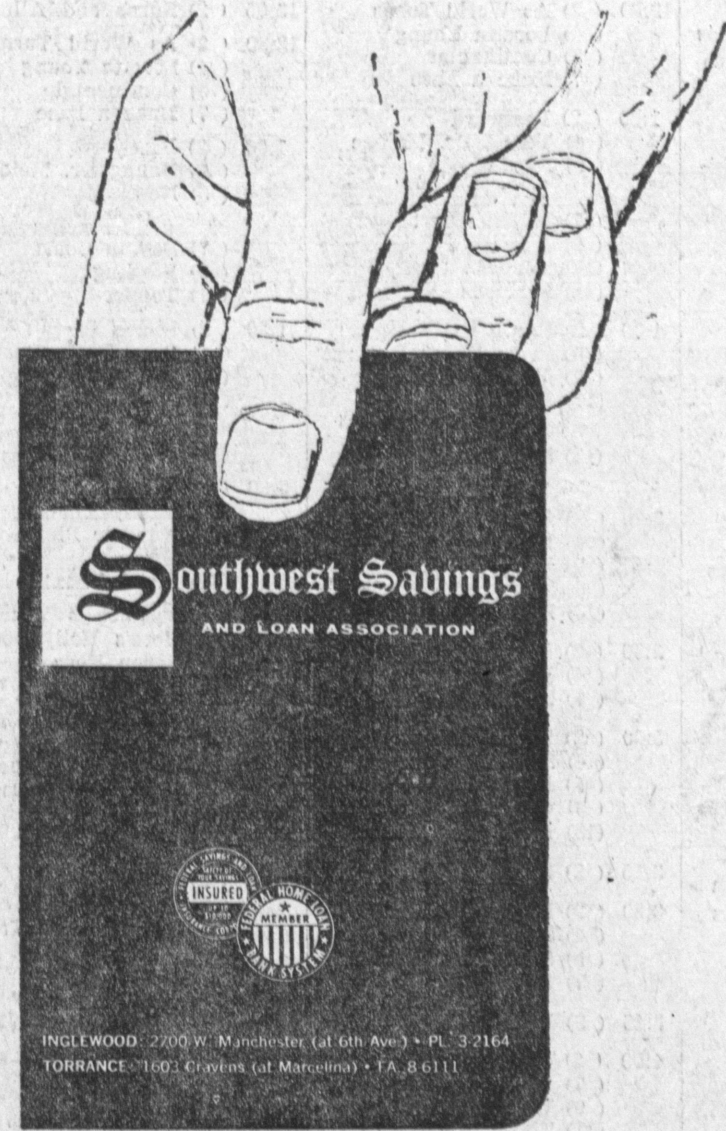
