American Baptist Women Hold Regional Convention

More than 1000 American Baptist women including several from Western Ave. Baptist Church, in Southern California will convene at First Baptist Church of Alhambra Thursday for their annual Woman's Day, part of the 1961 Southern California Baptist Convention.

Morning Session
The morning session will feature Rev. Herman Tegenfeldt, American Baptist missionary to Burma.

Following World War II, Mr. and Mrs. Tegenfeldt were among the first missionaries to return to Burma. Presently Tegenfeldt is missionary and general advisor to 30 churches and 10,000 christians in the Myitkyina District Baptist Association in Burma.

In addition to teaching two terms at Kachin Bible Training School in Kutai, Tegenfeldt has assisted in conducting training conferences for church leaders. He helped plan the Burma Baptist Convention in Myitkyina last year which was attended by 9,000 delegates.

The Tegenfeldts returned to the U. S. on furlough last December. He has been studying at the Western Washington College of Education, Bellingham, Wash., his home state.

At noon, the women will enjoy a Latin American luncheon, at First Baptist Church, Pasadena. Music will be provided by the Mexican Association. Mrs. John F. Lane, Sunland, is toastmistress, and Mrs. Walter Graham, San Luis Obispo, is chairman of the luncheon.

Some 30 missionaries from retired ministers and missionaries community in Alhambra, will be featured in a pageant, "1,376 years of Witness during the afternoon."

A fellowship Tea, sponsored by the State officers of the Woman's Baptist Mission Society of Southern California, will follow the afternoon session.

Local church women are invited to attend to meet State officers as well as receive information concerning missionary work in the local church.

Mrs. Verner I. Olson, Pasadena, president of the Southern California Baptist Women's Group, will preside over the day's activities.

Mrs. Robert Case, Long Beach, program chairman, and her committee have chosen "Steadfast Witnessing" as the theme for the day.

Following Woman's Day, the Southern California Baptist Convention will meet in a three-day conference. Top speakers for the Convention

are Rev. Tegenfeldt, and Dr. Bernard Ramm, professor at Covina Baptist Theological Seminary, Thursday; Dr. Harry Rowe from Australia, and Dr. George H. Armacost, president of the convention, Friday morning; Drs. Donald F. Thomas and Paul O. Madsen Friday afternoon and evening.

Saturday morning, Dr. Howard McBain, pastor of First Baptist Church of Covina, will speak on "Is a United Witness Relevant," followed by a closing message by Dr. A. George Downing, executive secretary of the Southern California Baptist Convention.
