Special Classes At Health Center

Classes for mothers-to-be will start Oct. 26, at 1 p.m. in the Torrance Health Center, 2300 W. Carson St., announced Dr. B. A. Logan, district health officer for the Los Angeles County Health Department.

Hygiene and pregnancy, labor, childbirth and care of the newborn are some of the topics to be discussed by Mrs. J. Mendoza, public health nurse - instructor. Films and demonstrations will be used throughout the seven session series.

The expectant parents classes are planned for the patients of private physicians. Continued attendance to the class is determined by the physician's consent. The classes supplement the teachings of the family physician and in no way do they take the place of early and adequate prenatal care.

In addition to the current expectant parents series, a series has been planned for February and another for April.

The expectant parents classes are an educational service of the Los Angeles County Health Department. There are no fees for this service.

Camp Fire Girls of Harbor District Begin Season Filled With Activity

Beginning this month all groups of the Harbor District Camp Fire Girls organization are convening in club houses, homes, churches and other meeting places to plan activities and service programs for the 1961-62 year under the auspices of the adult members of Camp Fire Girls.

In both morning and evening classes, adult leaders and sponsors are having their training sessions preparatory to heading up 95 groups of Blue Birds, Camp Fire Girls and Horizon Clubs active in the Harbor District this year. A total of 15 hours of special instruction qualifies individuals for their Camp Fire roles as leaders. Sponsors need only attend a 2-hour training session.

On an overall Council level such items as the Dolly Derby, Christmas caroling, the April candy sale, and 1962's camping program are being studied and arranged for by the individual groups.

On the local level, independent plans for Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas, Valentine's Day and Mother's Day are the interest of the leaders who are planning crafts' activities. Field trips are made to observatories, dairies, museums, bakeries, expositions, fairs, nature study exhibits—to mention only a few of these special expeditions. Adult leaders and members volunteer from all levels of service for the annual Com-

munity Chest Drive.

This year young people in the groups will serve their respective communities by introducing the "Flame" tree. This is an on-going project of the 50th Year Anniversary celebration of the Camp Fire Girls which took "root" in 1960-61 with the planting of five varieties of seeds of the Erythrina species (one species is commonly known to Southern Californians as the "Coral" tree).

These have been tended by Camp Fire Girls until, at the present time, the seedlings have developed enough in their growth cycle to be offered for planting in public parks and other public grounds. One thousand trees are being reserved for the new Harbor Regional Park.

It is anticipated that another thousand will be designated for public grounds and areas in the Los Angeles vicinity, including a great number to be earmarked for our own Harbor District, on a first-come, first-served basis until the present supply of seedlings is exhausted.

It is already planned to have many of the planting ceremonies take place on Arbor Day in March of 1962.
