Manuscripters Hear Charlotte Armstrong Talk on Her Writing

Charlotte Armstrong, popular award-winning mystery author will speak on "The Professional Short Story Writer" at a meeting of the Southwest Manuscripters, 8 p.m., Friday at Clark Stadium, 861 Valley Drive, Hermosa Beach.

With 15 successful mystery novels to her credit, Miss Armstrong has only added to her distinction as a "master of suspense" by authoring two Broadway plays, several television plays and numerous short stories published in such magazines as the Saturday Evening Post and McCall's.

Her story, "Ten Clues for Mr. Polkinghorn," appeared in the Ellery Queen Anthology 1961. For her novel, "Dram of Poison," the Mystery Writers' Association awarded Miss Armstrong the "Edgar," their highest annual award.

Other of her well-remembered works are "The Sev-

enteen Widows of San Souci," high on the best-seller lists of 1959, "Duo," (two short novels), "The Albacross," a collection of mystery stories, "The Girl with a Secret," and "Incident at a Corner."

Her novel, "The Unsuspected," was serialized in the Saturday Evening Post and later made into a motion picture starring Joan Caulfield and Claude Rains. The Glendale writer's two Broadway plays were "The Happiest Days," directed by Marc Connelly, and "Ring Around Elizabeth," starring Jane Cowl.
