Walter Knott, owner and manager of Knott's Berry Farm, will be guest speaker at the Thursday, October 26 meeting of Californians For Goldwater, South Bay Chapter. Knott was born in California and came to the Buena Park area in 1920. Since then the whole Knott family has given it's undivided at-

tention to the ten acres of land on which Knott's Berry Farm now stands. After his restaurant business began to flourish, Knott started work on something which has turned into a fascinating hobby. Ghost Town continues to grow. There has never been a place to stop building on it and there probably never will be.

In 1950 the family purchased and restored for posterity the old silver mining town of Calico, located near Barstow.

For the past few years Knott has devoted most of his time to the furthering of better government and expounding the benefits of the free enterprise system.

Plans Underway For Annual Rose Parade Entry

The City of Torrance will again be represented next year in the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Parade, according to an announcement by Chamber President Harold G. Frentz.

Entry has been made in the names of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce, Junior Chamber of Commerce, and the citizens of Torrance. General Chairman Bob Vroman will be assisted by Junior Chamber President Jerry Dunn and Chamber director Bill Greenwalt, who will serve as finance chairman. Mrs. Margaret Clark will again serve as float decorations chairman.

Stop Signs OK'd By County for Palos Verdes

Stop signs will be posted soon at the intersection of Basswood Ave. and Montemalaga Drive, Palos Verdes, Supervisor Burton W. Chace announced this week.

"The County Board of Supervisors adopted boulevard stop regulations for this intersection at its meeting today," he said. The new regulations will require vehicles traveling on Montemalaga Drive to stop before entering Basswood Ave.

"The restrictions will, in effect, make the intersection a four-way stop since traffic on Basswood Ave. is already required to stop."

"These regulations were recommended by the County Highway Safety Commission," Chace continued. "The Los Angeles County Road Department has been instructed to post the signs at the intersection immediately."

Signs will provide greater pedestrian safety for school children crossing the intersection, Chace said.

Allocate \$1600 For Lomita Street Improvements

Allocation of \$1600 for the improvement of 250th St. at the Pennsylvania Ave. intersection, Lomita, was announced this week by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Work will be scheduled by the Los Angeles County Road Department pending completion of other portions of the current work load, he said.

The improvement will consist of extending the pavement to join recently completed curb and gutter. In addition, a cross-gutter will be constructed across 250th St. on the west side of Pennsylvania Ave.

"This roadway project is one phase of work performed by the County Road Department in cooperation with property owners who constructed the curb and gutter under permit," Chace said.

County to Seek Expanded Library Service in Lomita

On motion by Supervisor Burton W. Chace, the Board of Supervisors last week asked County Librarian John Henderson "to undertake an immediate study to determine how the unincorporated territory north of San Pedro and west of Western Ave. can best be served."

Chace said that civic groups have called his attention to the "dire need for library facilities to service a rather large and heavily-populated area in the southern portion of my district. The area which several years ago was vacant land is now fully developed into homes and schools with several thousand students who are entirely without library services."

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Assemblyman to Display Guns at S&L Firm Offices

A rare gun collection owned by State Assemblyman Charles Edward Chapel will be on display at United Savings and Loan Association offices on a rotating basis until Nov. 17, according to George A. Thatcher, United's president.

The collection, which includes firearms used in the Revolutionary and Civil Wars and the winning of the West, will be initially displayed in the United office at 8600 S. Sepulveda.

Noted author, engineer, and assemblyman from California's 46th District, Chapel started collecting historical arms more than 40 years ago. He has studied most of the world's important gun collections and his articles on guns, as well as Western Americana, have appeared regularly in many national magazines. His most recent book is "Guns of the Old West."

In addition to the group of war weapons, the display includes a number of interestingly made pistols used by riverboat gamblers and dance-hall girls.

On succeeding weeks, the display can be seen at 11350 Crenshaw Blvd., Inglewood; 425 S. La Brea Blvd., Englewood; and 13905 San Antonio Dr., Norwalk.

Torrance Plant Purchases Assets Of Mich. Factory

The Federal Government last week sold a former defense plant in Adrian, Michigan—a surplus labor area—to a corporation who plans to put the huge plant back into production.

Final papers were signed in Washington turning over the former government owned aluminum extrusion plant, formerly known as Air Force Plan No. 60, to Harvey Aluminum of Torrance, California.

Sale climaxed intense effort by the government, undertaken at the direction of President Kennedy, and the Secretary of Labor, to find a user-buyer for the idle industrial property.

Final papers consummating the sale were signed by Administrator John L. Moore of the General Services Administration, the government property management agency, and Vice President S. K. Linden of Harvey Aluminum.

Witnessing the signing were Senator Pat McNamara of Michigan and Wm. B. Welsh, administrative assistant of Senator Philip A. Hart of Michigan, who is out of the country on government business.

Seek to Name Western Ave. as State Highway

The County Board of Supervisors this week adopted a resolution requesting the California Highway Commission to designate Western Ave. as a State highway between the proposed San Diego Freeway and 25th St. in San Pedro, Burton W. Chace reported.

At the same time, the board urged the State Division of Highways and the California Highway Commission to program and budget construction funds for the early improvement of Western Ave. from Avenida Arrenda to Palos Verdes Drive North.

COUNTY OKAYS

Chace noted that the Board adopted an order in August authorizing County Road Commissioner N. H. Templin to present four specific highway matters of county-wide interest for discussion at the October meeting of the California Highway Commission in Santa Monica. One of these items related to the addition to the State highway system of a new route from the San Diego Freeway in the Torrance area to 25th St. in San Pedro.

"In the interest of cooperating with the State to expedite the improvement of Western Ave.," Chace said, "the County of Los Angeles declared its willingness to acquire and clear the necessary rights-of-way, prepare the construction plans and, at State expense, advertise, award and inspect a construction contract for the improvement."

The county and cities have manifested their recognition of the importance of Western Ave. by large expenditures for the reconstruction and widening to master plan standards of this highway facility, Chace said.

MASTER PLANS

County and City of Los Angeles have, in recent years, completed the improvement to master plan standards of the section from 19th St. to Avenida Arrenda at a cost of \$1,064,000 of which the County provided \$1,030,000.

Most recently improved portion of Western Ave. from Summerland Ave. to Avenida Arrenda was completed by the County in August of this year. The next logical project in the continuation of the stage improvement of Western is the segment from Avenida Arrenda to Palos Verdes
