

State's School Heads Schedule LA Sessions

More than 2000 supervisors from school systems throughout the state are expected to attend the annual conference on direction and improvement of instruction and on child welfare scheduled October 30 to November 3 at the Statler Hilton Hotel in Los Angeles.

Called annually by State Superintendent of Schools Dr. Roy Simpson, the conference will include nationally known experts in the field, five general sessions, numerous exhibits and and workshop meetings.

Two organizations of school people will participate in the conference—the California Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development and the California Association of Supervisors of Child Welfare and Attendance.

This year's conference will have as its theme "Education and the National Purpose." General sessions and section meetings will examine these questions of significance to California's educational leaders:

STUDIES

1. The impact of contemporary conditions upon individual students,
2. How to encourage the

development of individuals to their greatest potential,

3. The advance of international events as they effect American — and Californian — education.

4. The implications of these on California schools and curriculum.

The opening general session on Tuesday (October 31) will be called to order at 8 p.m. by Dr. Sybil Richardson, president of the California Association for Supervision and Curriculum Development.

Featured speakers during the week-long conference will include Dr. Richard Clowes, associate superintendent of the California State Department of Education; James Quillen, dean of the Stanford University School of Education; Dr. Arthur Combs, of the University of Florida; Dr. Ole Sand, director of the National Education Association's project on instruction; and Mrs. Georgiana Hardy, member of the Los Angeles City Board of Education.

Although day classes consist entirely of male students, the evening courses have a number of women enrolled, Miss Westgate said.

WIDE FIELD "Amazing things can be done with electronics," Miss Westgate stated.

She related stories of electronic machines capable of performing in minutes tasks that would take a man several days to complete.

She remarked that automation so dominates our present day world that in some cases people are finding their jobs being taken over completely by machines.

Electronics is still a relatively new field and the opportunities are unlimited, she said.
