Ironic Twist Shown To Minority's Side

An ironic twist became evident this week in the case of the badly bungled referendum petition as city employees set out to defend a position that their own city council has opposed.

It all started two weeks ago when the petitions, calling for a vote of the people on the controversial Marble Estates rezoning issue, were brought to the city clerk's office for filing.

Shortly after they were filed it was noted that a large percentage of the signatures were not accompanied by the required addresses, dates and precinct numbers.

Employees in the office allowed the circulators of the petitions to alter them to include these essential items.

They were immediately slapped with an injunction prohibiting them from certifying the petitions until such time as the courts could decide if any laws had been broken.

IRONIC TOUCH

However, and here's the ironic touch, earlier the majority of the city council had approved the rezoning of the tract for residential use . . , and the purpose of the petitions was to nullify their decision.

Therefore, any defense of the actions of these employees by the city attorney's office must hinge on justifying the circulation of the petitions, and must oppose the opinion of the majority of the city council. Thus we see the city in the position of paying

to justify a position that the majority of the council oppose.

It's a very ticklish situation, but it is bound to occur whenever the public allows a small, but noisy. minority to represent themselves as the majority.

It is to the everlasting credit of at least four of the seven councilmen who are holding their ground against this bloc of dissidents that they intend to bring no pressure against the employees who, innocently enough, were caught in this political squeeze
