His subject will be "Communism Behind the Bamboo Curtain."

Wang, the son of a Chinese banker, graduated from Nanyang High School in 1918. His college work was taken at the school of commerce, New York University and was completed in 1922.

Wang returned to his native China and served in executive positions with banking, manufacturing, land investment and foreign exchange brokerage firms until 1951. In that year he managed to escape from China and the red regime when he refused to cooperate with and join the Communist party.

"Mr. Wang has brought home to thousands of individuals the true hard facts of communism as he himself experienced them in his native China," Mrs. Marguerite Robinson, member of the Altru Club and cosmology instructor at El Camino College said.

Put Guidelines On Form 1040 For Sales Tax

Mortimer M. Caplin, U.S. commissioner of Internal revenue, announced that the service will again provide guidelines for taxpayers residing in states with general sales tax laws for estimating sales tax deductions for 1961.

The guidelines will take the form of sales tax tables which will show average amounts spent by residents for sales taxes.

These tables are intended to serve as guides for taxpayers who itemize the deductions on their Federal income tax return, Form 1040.

"We believe this information will make it easier for taxpayers to fill out the portion of their return which relates to the sales tax deductions," Caplin said.

The sales tax tables will be available in the respective district director's office on or about Dec. 6.

symposium promote the study of science and mathematics, particularly at the high school level; to demonstrate the part which the humanities play in development of scientists; to recognize talented youth and assist them in developing their interests and abilities.

The symposium featured original research papers by students as well as panels by persons identified prominently with the sciences.

Award Contract for PV Sewers, Construction

Chace said that five concerns submitted bids on the work ranging from a low of \$67,982 to a high of \$95,488.

Construction Co. of Anaheim was approximately 10 per cent estimate.

Lambie told Chace the new construction is in the Palos Verdes area, bound on the west by Palos Verdes Drive East, Saddle Road on the east, Carriage Drive on the north and Conestoga Drive to the south.

Construction is expected to get under way in about 10 days.

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Report Rise In Union Sales

Sales of Union Carbide Corporation for the third quarter of 1961 were \$397,011,000, a record high for this quarter, Morse G. Dial, chairman and chief executive officer, reported.

This is an increase of 4 per cent over sales of \$383,159,000 in the second quarter of this year, and 3 per cent over sales of \$385,869,000 in the third quarter of 1960.

Net income for the third quarter amounted to \$35,175,000, or \$1.16 per share.

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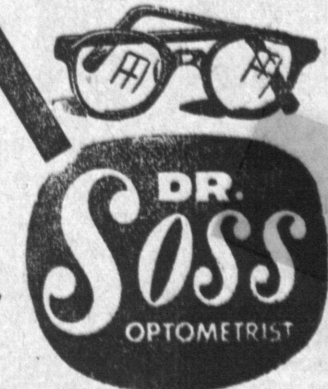
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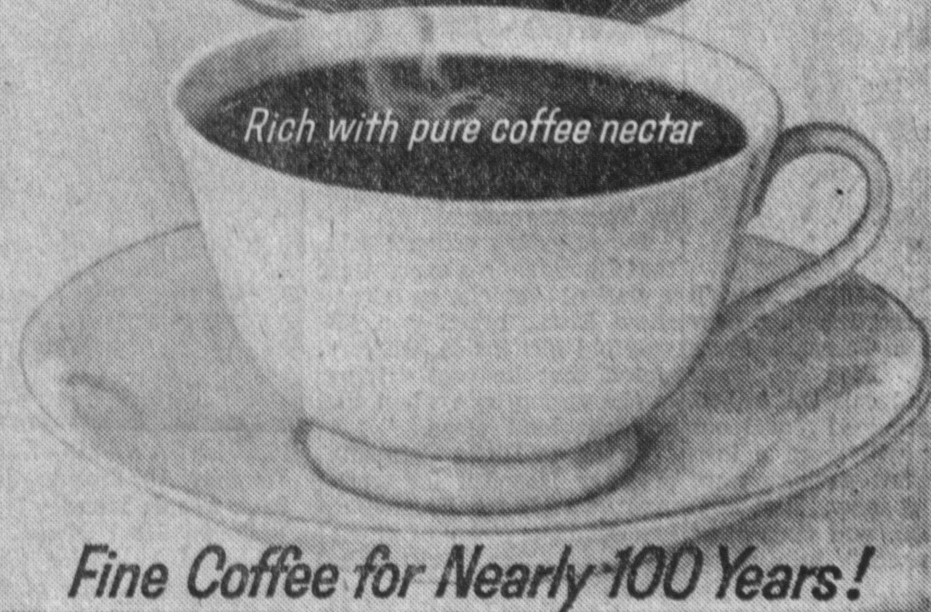
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
