

Education Week . . .

Typical Day at School Presented for Parents

The typical school day will be presented to parents this week as Torrance schools participate in American Education Week.

"We believe that parents want to see in the classrooms the same things that go on there every day," Superintendent J. H. Hull said.

Teachers and principals have been asked to show how they apply the Torrance philosophy of education, the superintendent said.

First lesson of the day is patriotism. Students sing the national anthem and repeat the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag.

Math Classes

In mathematics classes, a new method of teaching will be presented.

Division is taught as a series of subtractions; old percentage problems are solved by using a new ratio method.

Physical education classes now place emphasis on physical fitness, rather than games.

After several weeks of exercises and calisthenics, students are tested to check progress.

Language laboratories in which Spanish, French, German and English are taught are another innovation in the

schools.

Students are able to hear themselves speaking a language in order to gain correct pronunciation.

Teachers Experiment

Teachers are part of an experiment, too.

They are teaching in teams. Teachers of several classes combine talents to instruct children in large, medium and small groups.

This method aims to give teacher and pupil opportunity and time to broaden subject knowledge.

Creative writing is another student project.

Examples of themes and term papers will be displayed on bulletin boards throughout the week.

School officials say effectiveness of learning spelling and proper grammar through writing seems to be paying off.

Portable laboratories for science classes are used in most schools.

Teachers and students can prepare experiments at any time and use them in several classes because of portability.

Superintendent Hull said visitors will be welcome at any time during the week.
