Four-Year-Old Dies After Tumble Into Dominguez Channel

A 4-year old Torrance youngster fell to his death Monday afternoon while playing on a bridge across a drainage channel at 169th St. and Arlington.

Pronounced dead on arrival at Little Company of Mary Hospital was Jules Anongoes, 3404 W. 186th

Mother of the youngster, Mrs. Loretta H. Anongoes, told police investigators that the youngster had never wandered so far away from home before. Usual place for the youngster to play, she said, was an empty field down the street.

First report that the youngster had fallen from the bridge into the 25-foot

moned police and fire units arrived at the scene they found the bridge and channel banks crowded with neigborhood residents. However, apparently no one witnessed the youngster's fall.

One resident of the neighborhood reported;
