## Clinic Planned At Serra High

A polio clinic will be conducted Thursday, from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. in the Serra High School cafeteria, 14830 South Van Ness Ave., Gardena.

Clinic will be sponsored by the Serra Mothers Club, according to Mrs. Stanley Rymzsa, health chairman.

A fee of \$1 per shot will be made, with a \$5 family maximum.

Dr. D. L. Brown will be in charge of administering the serum.

The clinic is part of an intensified program to prevent the recurrence of polio epidemics and to reduce the number of individual cases to an absolute minimum.

It is anticipated that within the near future, school children will be required to submit evidence that they have received protective polio shots, Mrs. Rymzsa reported.
