Three Area High Schools Win All Weekend Games

A tough Redondo eleven failed to stop North High Friday night in her bid for a place in the CIF.

North in their annual Homecoming game defeated Redondo 33 to 19.

A 23 yard run by Jeff Bell started things rolling for the Saxons and set up the first score of the game, made by Doug Ball.

In the second quarter, a series of plays, starting with a Redondo fumble which was recovered by the Saxons, brought North to the RB 15 yard line, the five and the three and finally to a crash across the goal line by Jeff Bell.

Redondo's John Fowler scampered to the goal for the Seahawks comeback to North's two previous scoring runs.

On the kickoff by Redondo following their first score, Dan Claxton thundered 65 yards for another Saxon tally.

Temper flared in the last of the second as Redondo fought their way to the Saxons three yard line where Bob Johnson crashed through for a TD.

At the end of the first half the score stood at 20-12 North. No score was made by either team in the third quarter as they battered back and forth.

A 47 yard run by Joe Castorena for a touchdown started things rolling again in the fourth, while, in a final bid for the game, Jon Fowler scampered 14 yards for a Seahawk tally.

With but 15 seconds of play left in the game the Saxons tied the ribbon on the score with another run. Final 33-19 score puts North in heavy CIF position.

In other topheavy games South trampled Leuzinger High, 21-7, while Torrance High clobbered Palos Verdes, 35-13.

Skin Diving Safety Committee Schedules Special Sessions on Diver Training

In furtherance of Los Angeles County's official campaign for maximum safety measures, the newly organized county Skin and Scuba Diving Advisory Committee will consider additional moves at its second monthly session in Los Angeles on Monday, Nov. 27, at 10 a.m.

By direction of the Board of Supervisors, the committee will function under Chairmanship of Lieut. Commander Leslie Thompson, of the U.S. Naval Station at Long Beach.

Supervisory Chairman Ernest E. Debs announced that regular and special sessions of the committee will be held in the conference room of the Los Angeles County Department of Parks and Recreation, 155 W. Washington Boulevard. All meetings will be open, and the press is invited.

TRAINING FILM

Among the items planned for discussion on the November 27 meeting are: feasibility of a 15-minute color film on diver training safety to be made available for public showing.

The committee will use its influence in behalf of any additional legislation required to enforce safety practices in recreational and commercial diving. It is now reviewing such remedial recommendations for consideration of city, county, and state legislative bodies.

In particular, the committee is interested in making it illegal for an air station to sell oxygen tanks to non-certified divers. This assertedly would cut down the loss of life and accidents among amateur divers.

The committee will sponsor a wide program of public education on proper skin and scuba diving practices.

At its initial meeting in October, the committee launched its program.
