

Supervisors Urge More Personnel For Dope Search

Supervisor Burton W. Chace said this week that the only way to stop smuggling of narcotics into California by ships is to have more personnel to search vessels which arrive in Los Angeles Harbor.

Chace made this statement following a report from the County Counsel pointing out that it is impossible to make a thorough search of ships arriving in the Harbor area with the personnel presently available to the Customs Service.

"When a number of ships arrive at the same time, it is impossible to make a thorough search of each vessel as would be desirable," Chace said.

The report by the County Counsel, however, noted that "the vast bulk of the narcotics which comes into this area comes across the border from Mexico and not through the Harbor area."

The report was made to the board following conferences with the Sheriff, District Attorney, and Los Angeles Police Department.

Harvey Aluminum Reports Gains Made in 1961

Continued growth in sales and profits for the fiscal year ended September 30, 1961 were announced by Harvey Aluminum (Incorporated). Net profit after taxes was \$7,100,163 compared with \$5,007,837 for the same period last year. This amounts to \$1.43 earnings per share based on 4,955,479 the average number of shares outstanding as of September 30, 1961 compared with \$1.19 based on the average number of shares of 4,194,672 outstanding as of September 30, 1960. Sales totaled \$86,444,767 compared with \$59,681,142 for the preceding year.

Lawrence A. Harvey, chairman of the board, said that the continued growth was attributable to a growing increase in productive mill capacities of the various plants of the corporation for aluminum; substantial quantities of other specialty metals processed by the corporation; further integration from refining of raw materials through to mill products; and an increase in the scope of the capabilities of the mill product fabrication plants.

ATTENTION

The corporation, Harvey said, has paid particular attention not only to the results to be achieved through integration, automation, and advanced management techniques, but also through aggressive selling and merchandising of the company's mill products staffed with company graduates from an intensive long range engineer-turned-salesman program. This year the company established three new factory branches for sales and service. It also established National distributions to warehouses of all the company's products through

service center facilities.

The company has previously announced it is putting into operation in 1962 a new wrought aluminum products plant in Michigan, substantially duplicating the facilities at its Torrance works and thus almost doubling its current aluminum mill products output. Work progress has already started on its Western sheet and strip rolling mill with a capacity of over thirty thousand tons.

The board of directors of the company, at a meeting held November 20, 1961, at the principal offices of the company in Torrance, California, declared a quarterly dividend of 30 cents per share on A Common Stock of Harvey Aluminum (Incorporated), payable December 31, 1961, to stockholders of record of A Common Stock at the close of business on December 11, 1961.
