Auto Stars Argue Merits of Indy's Cement Track

Two of America's brightest young auto racing stars—Jim Hurtubise and Parnelli Jones—agree that the 150 mph lap at the Indianapolis Speedway is NOT just around the corner.

Hurtubise, in fact, holds the record—149.592, a figure he set as "500" rookie of the year in 1960.

Parnelli, the USAC sprint car national champion, succeeded Hurtubise as the top rookie this year at the Speedway.

"Now that the bricks on the main straight have been covered with pavement it seems that everyone assumes the 150 mph lap will be reached next May," commented Hurtubise. "Well, I don't think so."

"The bricks made it bumpy all right, but to break that barrier we'll have to get more speed in the corners," he explained. "The rough spot took its toll on chassis. They won't take the beating now. So, removing the bricks is a good safety feature and makes for a smoother ride, but it doesn't necessarily increase the speed."

"To reach 150 I'd have to improve only a half-second on my best lap. Believe me, that's a big barrier."

Jones, who will battle Hurtubise and Indianapolis winner A. J. Foyt Thursday night at Ascot Park in the annual Thanksgiving midget Grand Prix, says the bricks just meant a rougher ride.

"Everything has to be perfect to hit 150," said Parnelli. "I'm talking about the car, the wind, the temperature . . . and, of course, the driver. I don't see much chance of it happening very soon."

Two North High seniors and two South High seniors are semi-finalists in the National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test.

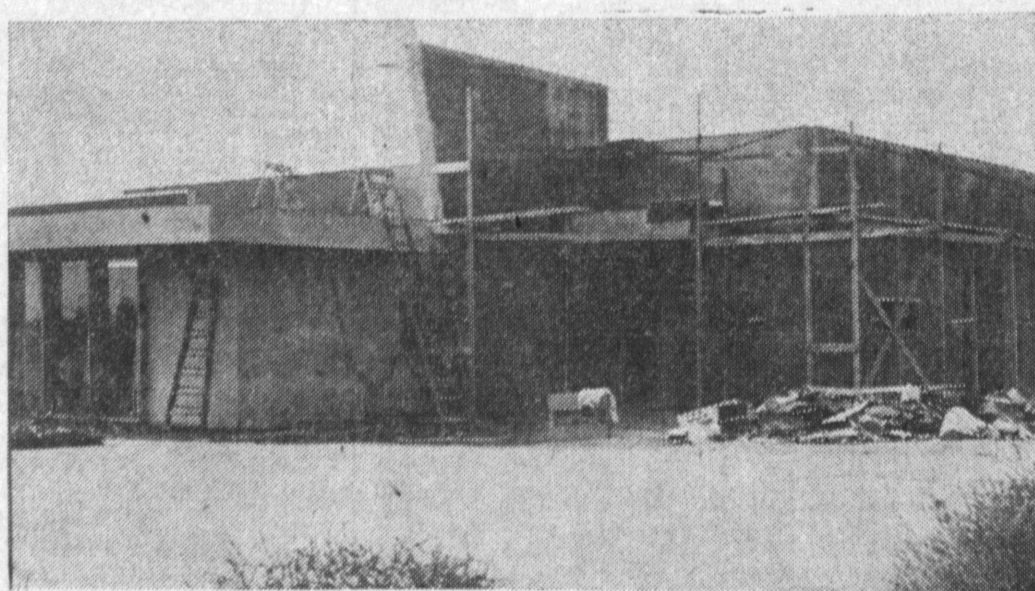
Irene Hanson and Carolyn Mohr of South High and David Lippman and Gayle Perry of North High are the students.

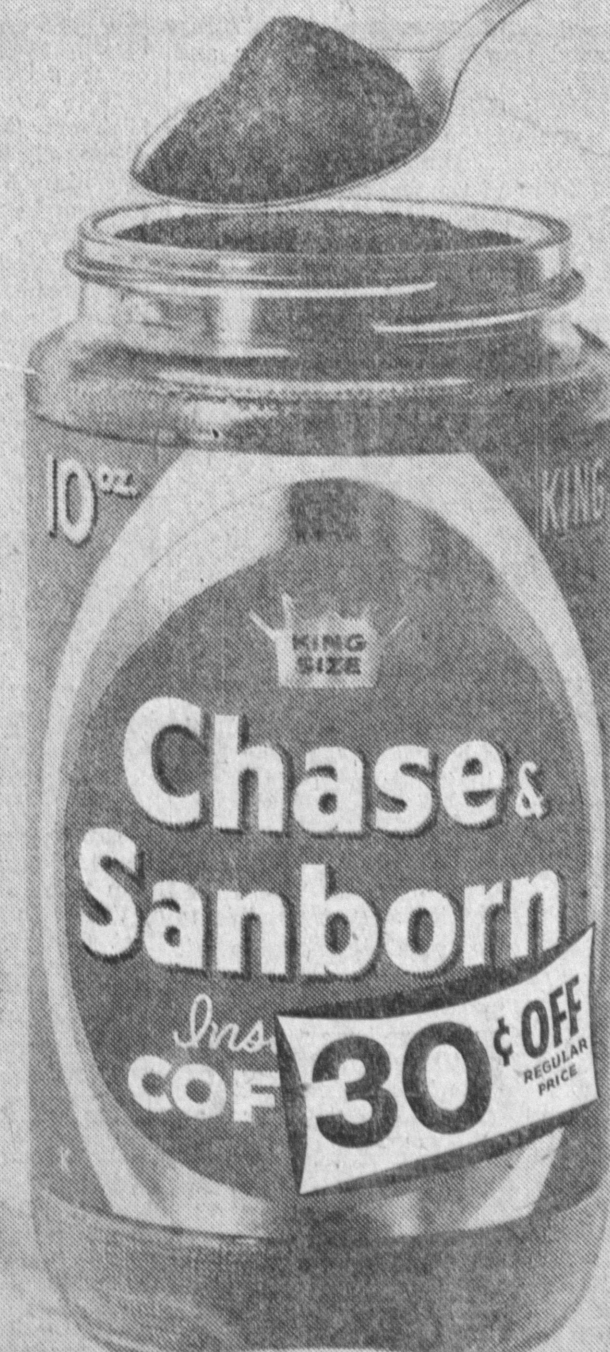
