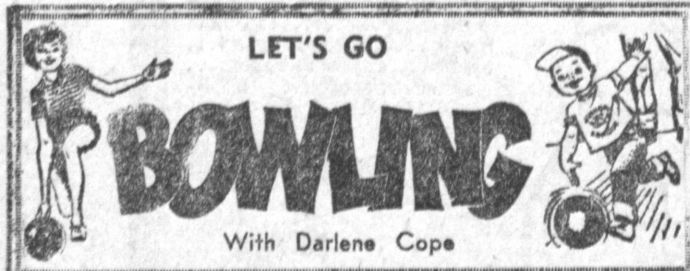

Goalie Mike Nolan turned in a tremendous defensive job for the El Camino College water poloists, turning back innumerable scoring attempts, but Cerritos College proved too much for EC as the Falcons earned an 8-5 victory in the first round of the Southern California Junior College Championships at Cerritos Tuesday.

Nolan, an All-CIF goalie while attending Morningside High, was the main reason the Indians were able to stick within three points of the Falcons, as EC tried to celebrate Christmas early, giving the ball to Cerritos on sloppy play in many crucial spots during the contest.

Jim Garbill, just returning from a bout with mononucleosis, was another cog in Camino's vain effort, sparkling both offensively and defensively with his aggressive play.

Dave Ashleigh poked in four goals out of 13 tries to lead the Cerritos scorers.

Against their final Metropolitan Conference foe of the season, the second place Warriors barreled over Santa Monica City College, 23 to 7.

Banging home six points in the first quarter to the Corsair's one, the Tribe never looked back. EC built up the lead with a five-point outburst in the second quarter and point splurges of eight and four goals in the third and final periods.

Two Losses in Five Years Record for Area Grappler

Displaying an exceptional record of only two losses in five years, one of the best wrestlers in the South Bay area, Redondo's Frank Addleman, is set for the best wrestling dual meet in the state on Friday night, December 1, at 7:30 p.m. in the El Camino College Women's Gym.

Before a crowd of 1,001 fans, the alumni squeezed by the varsity 19-18 in the initial meeting of the wrestling giants last fall. Every match was so exciting that five of the matches were decided by a single point and one match ended in a tie. The El Camino Varsity wrestlers only other loss was to San Bernardino, California state J.C. champs last season.

JC CHAMP

Addleman, the alum's 150-pounder, won the California state JC championship while competing for El Camino in 1956 and was second in 1959. At Long Beach State College, he was unbeaten in dual meet competition for two years and was named the outstanding wrestler at Long Beach in 1960-61 after capturing third place in 1961 and fourth in 1960 in the Pacific Coast Inter-Collegiate championships. He represented the beach school in the National Collegiate Amateur Association Finals at Oregon in 1961.

In freestyle wrestling, Addleman captured the Southern Pacific AAU Championship in 1961 at 136½ pounds and nabbed fourth in the Olympic Regional 1960 Trials.

While competing at Redondo Beach Union High School, Addleman captured

the Bay League championship in 1954 and 1955. He finished second in the CIF finals in 1955.

Wrestling experts describe Addleman as exceptionally fast; he is a grappler who enjoys pushing his opponent until the opponent is exhausted. He is virtually impossible to take down and is always in top physical condition.
