Edison Gives Stock Split Information

A three for one split of Southern California Edison Company's common stock and original preferred stock was recommended to stockholders Nov. 16 by the Board of Directors.

According to Harold Quinton, board chairman, a special meeting of stockholders will be held Dec. 21 to consider amending Edison's Articles of Incorporation to change the present 16,000,000 authorized shares of common stock, \$25 par value, into 48,000,000 shares, \$8 1/3 par value.

Change of the present 160,000 authorized shares of original preferred stock, \$25 par value, into 480,000 shares, par value \$2 1/3, will also be considered.

This amendment would also provide that each of the shares of cumulative preferred stock and preference stock will have voting rights on the basis of three votes per share.

An application seeking authority to split the stock was filed by Edison with the California Public Utilities Commission.

Edison Directors also announced plans for a new common stock offering.

The company plans to issue and sell 1,500,000 of the new shares.

It is intended that proceeds from the offering will be used to help finance Edison's continuing construction program, and to retire bank loans, a portion of which will have been used to redeem the company's 4.88 per cent cumulative preferred stock, which the board voted to call at today's meeting, Quinton said.

An application in connection with the stock issue will be filed with the Public Utilities Commission early in December, as now scheduled, and a registration statement will be filed with the Securities and Exchange Commission at about the same time.

Quinton stated that, subject to earnings and other factors which affect dividend declarations, the board expressed its intention to pay dividends on the split stock at an annual rate of

Concerning the stock split, Quinton said that the company will solicit proxies from stockholders of record No. 24 for the special stockholders meeting Dec. 21.

No action by stockholders is required until they receive their proxy statements. The directors also declared regular quarterly dividends payable Dec. 31 to stockholders of record Dec. 5 on the original preferred stock and the 4.32 per cent cumulative preferred stock.
