

Report Sale of Standard Oil Property

The long awaited news that the sale of some 200 acres of Standard Oil Co. property in South Torrance had been completed and that a huge construction program was slated for the property, was received Friday afternoon.

The property, known as

the Marble Fee tract, fronts on the south side of Sepulveda., between Madrona and Crenshaw Blvd.

City officials and newsmen alike have been waiting for nearly two months for the sale of the property to clear escrow.

Purchaser of the prop-

erty is the Sierra Corporation of San Francisco, a subsidiary of the Utah Construction and Mining Company.

Purchase price of the property was not disclosed but is rumored to be in excess of \$2,500,000.

Property, which is pres-

ently zoned for industrial use, will spearhead a new era of "balanced development" in Torrance, spokesmen for the purchasing firm said.

Immediate plans call for the development of the tract for light manufacturing, commercial and re-

sidential use. Residential portion will probably be apartments and multiple units.

ADJACENT

Newly purchased land parcel lies adjacent to the Marble Estates property scene of a smoldering controversy several

months ago.

Developers had attempted to get the 155 acre Marble Estates tract rezoned from industrial to residential use and indicated that they would build some 600 single family residences on the land, which adjoins present

housing development at the corner of Sepulveda and Crenshaw Blvd.

Rezoning try failed after circulation of petitions and an extended court action.

City officials said that the sale of the huge tract of land heralded a new era of growth and devel-

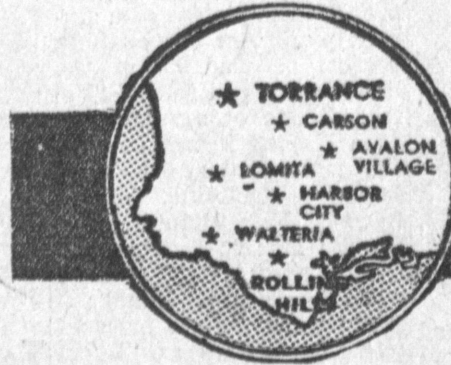
opment along Sepulveda Blvd. where some of the city's largest parcels of undeveloped land now lie.

Close to one of the largest commercial centers in the community the development of this property should give the necessary impetus to the future growth of the area.

Burglar Fires As Arresting Officer Nears

A Torrance youth is in critical condition at Gardena General Hospital today after shooting himself in the head to avoid arrest as a burglary suspect.

Listed in critical condition by hospital physicians is Attilio Granzella, 24, of 20413 S. New Hampshire.

Investigating officers stated that they received a call early yesterday morning to check out a burglary at Arico's Market 15202 Hawthorne Blvd., Lawndale.

During the checkout at the store officers discovered that an attempt had been made to break open the safe containing the rest of the day's receipts.

Six police officers, with drawn guns, then went over the premises to see if the

suspect was still there.

In a storage room to the rear of the store one of the officers approached a pile of boxes.

When he neared the stack he heard a gun fired on the other side. On the far side of the pile of boxes he found Granzella lying with pistol on the floor beside him.

Nearby, they found a small drill motor with which the suspect had apparently tried to open the safe.

Advertise Bids For Restoration Of Local Beaches

Advertising for bids for restoration of Redondo-Clifton County Beach was announced this week by Supervisor Burton W. Chace.

Action came following a request by Chace last week that plans and specifications to halt erosion at the two county beaches be expedited.

The Board of Supervisors approved specifications for the project which call for excavating, transporting and placing approximately 100,000 cubic yards of inland dune sand on the eroded portion of Redondo and Clifton County beaches.

A local improvement company has offered to give free of charge to the County approximately 100,000 cubic yards of sand.

Chace noted that "the time to act is now because County buildings and service roads valued at \$100,000 are

in jeopardy and 100,000 cubic yards of sand are available free of charge to do the job."

Although the sand will be given free, cost of excavating, transporting and placing the sand on the eroded tract.

portions of the County-owned beaches is estimated at \$68,000.

Bids will be opened on January 3. Construction time is estimated at 45 days after execution of the contract.

Restraining Order Hearing Delayed; Reset for Dec. 27

A restraining order, prohibiting further action by the city council against plans to build an apartment house in South Torrance, will remain in effect, it was reported Friday evening.

Hearing on the restraining order had been called for Friday morning in Inglewood Superior Court but was deferred until Wednesday, Dec. 27 because of a crowded court calendar.

Case will be heard by Superior Court Judge Howard McLain, who also signed the restraining order.

Permanent injunction is sought by builder George Bloxom, who plans to construct the units on Madison Ave., between 227th St. and 230th St.

Permission to build the apartments was granted at an earlier session but, when some 150 signed protests were submitted to the council, it was decided to reopen the case for further study.

At this point Bloxom, through his attorney Parke Moewe, sought and received the restraining order.

City is represented by Stanley Remelmeyer, city attorney.

Hearing will determine whether the city will be released to make further decisions in the case or whether a permanent injunction will be issued.

'Babyfaced' Bandit Robs Service Station Attendant

In a daring midweek robbery a gun waving bandit, described as "baby-faced" by his victim, calmly held up a service station attendant and walked away with an estimated \$100 in receipts.

Allen Denbo, night attendant at Pauley's Service Station, 1886 Lomita Blvd., told investigating officers that the gunman hid in the men's restroom until the station was clear of customers. After the last customer left the bandit came out, pointed a 22 caliber pistol at Denbo and ordered him to hand over the money in the cash drawer.

EVEN COINS

After taking the entire drawer including small coins the suspect herded the attendant into a back room of the station, told him not to come out for "five minutes" and departed on foot.

Denbo told the officers that he waited for one minute before coming out and telephoning the police.

He said that he had another \$150 in his pocket but was not searched by the bandit.

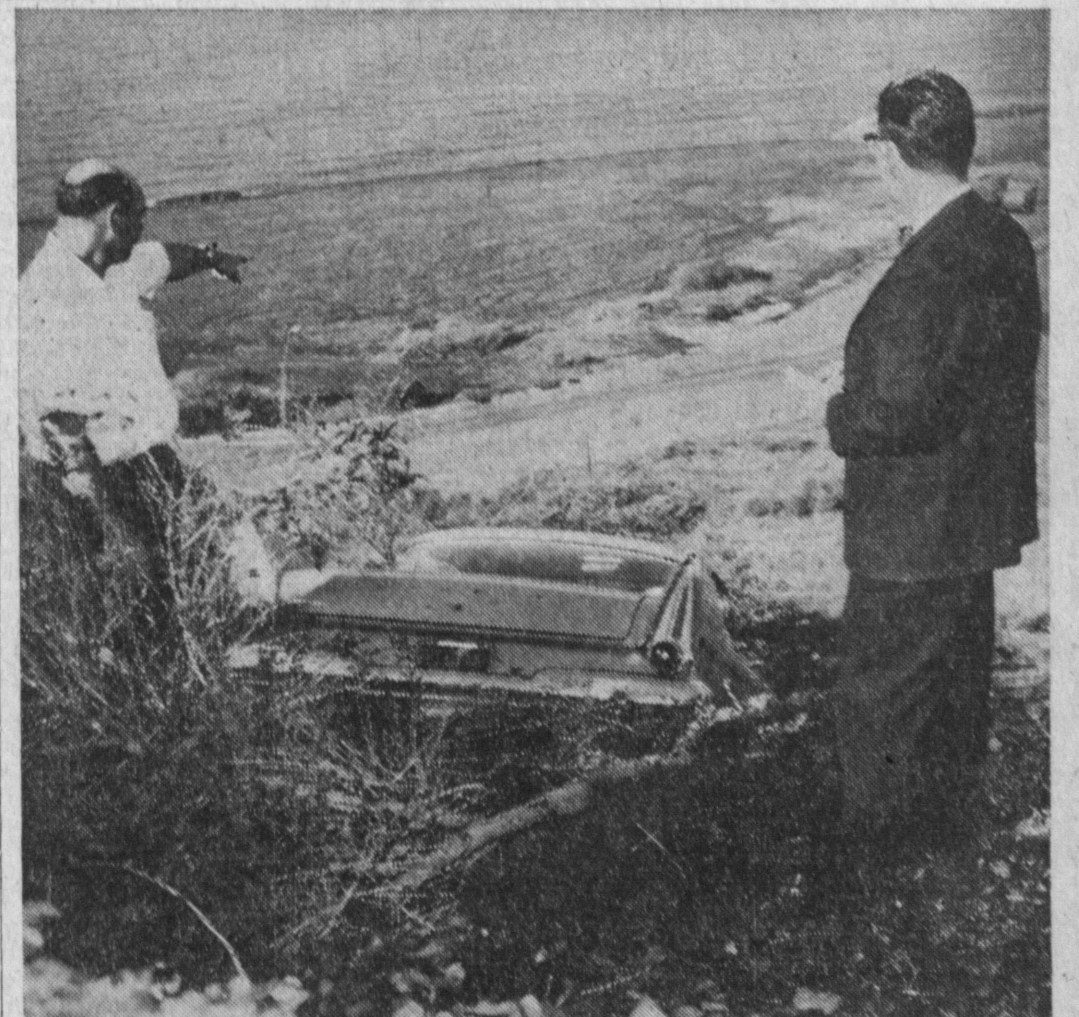
Suspect was described as being about 5'7" in height, weight about 150 pounds, wearing a grey felt hat, grey car coat and tan slacks. Denbo said that he was "light complected and looked very young."

Police cars scoured the neighborhood but no trace of the suspect was found.
