Federation Votes To Support Bill

Mrs. Earl J. Hazelton, Orlando, president, California Federation of Women's Clubs, has urged clubwomen in California to do everything possible to reduce the highway traffic toll during the coming holiday season. "Be sure your car is equipped with safety belts and use them. As a driver, keep alert and stay alive, as the year-end holidays seem to be the most dangerous time on our streets and

highways," Mrs. Hazelton said at the state executive board meeting in Bakersfield.

In line with the policy of the federation to support the preservation of the wilderness area, the board voted to endorse U.S. Senate Bill 174, known as the wilderness bill.

Executive board members voted to assume the responsibility of contacting local school officials and district attorneys to find the reasoning behind the ban on the singing of Christmas carols in schools.

Other action included: co-sponsoring the annual awards banquet of the California Mental Health Association; setting up a continuing committee of five members, appointed by the president, to review district boundaries, and report to the 1963 convention, their recommendations.

Mrs. Hazelton announced the committee consisting of Mmes. J. J. Smith, Colton, chairman; Thorkild Thomson, Mendocino City; D. L. Tosh and E. F. Bryant, Corona; George Alexander, North Sacramento.

Mrs. Hazelton announced that 565 of the 841 clubs in California federation entered the community improvement program.

Traditions Vary from Land to Land

It all started with gold and frankincense and myrrh. Since the time of the three wise men, Christians have celebrated the birth of Jesus Christ by exchanging gifts. But the exotic fragrances have disappeared and the wise men have been almost crowded out of the Nativity scene.

Children in South America, however still wait for the three wise men. And to compensate them for their long journey from the East, they leave water and hay on the doorstep for the wise men's camels.

Children, regardless of race, creed or color, who are in need of surgery, medical care or health aids, and whose parents are in the income bracket above that which can receive state or county aid are helped.

Mrs. Edward Burke, parlor president, said many children throughout the state have been restored to health and the happiness all youngsters deserve, because of this NDGW fund.

A few years ago, Mrs. Burke explained, the state-

wide Native Daughters of the Golden West, oldest Women's patriotic organization in California, decided there was a need for such a fund, which would assist ailing children of parents whose income is too high to get help from the state or county.

Yet, due to the high cost of living, clothing and maintaining a large family and probably caring for aged relatives, these parents are beset with bills.

Immediate Care
When such a problem is brought to the attention of the Native Daughters of the Golden West, and thorough investigation is made by trained by professional workers of the NDGW, the child is immediately cared for.

The money used to aid the child is a gift — not a loan, said Mrs. Burke.

Funds for the maintenance of this statewide project are raised by the approximately 225 NDGW parlors, throughout California.

Money is raised by giving dinners, fashion shows and other endeavors.

Recently, Beverly Hills Parlor held a Christmas bazaar and dinner, and proceeds went to the Children's Foundation.
