Yuletide Mission Brings Naval Reservists Home

Seventy Southern California Naval Air Reservists returned home Saturday from a "world-wind" Christmas service tour over three continents.

Representing Torrance in the operation are Lieutenant Commander Ralph A. Baxter, 5410 Carol Drive, a Western Air Lines pilot; Lieutenant Commander Richard J. Lange, 107 Desford St., assistant field superintendent, County Sanitation District No. 2; and James V. Trospier, aviation machinist's mate first class, 2421 178th St., leadman, North American Aviation Co.

Three Naval four engine Douglas transports of squadron VR-772 landed at their home base at NAS Los Alamitos following a 23,000 mile mission across North America, Africa, and Europe.

For two weeks the squadron, under the command of CDR. John E. Stevenson of Alhambra, relieved regular squadron VR-24 at NAS Port Lyautey, Morocco, in support of the Mediterranean Sixth Fleet.

CARGO DELIVERY In 14 days the Los Angeles area civilian crew breached the winter Atlantic to deliver a \$100,000 cargo of medical supplies and Christmas gifts to charitable organizations aboard; re-unite serve families for the holidays; and carried tons of Christmas mail from service men stationed throughout the Mediterranean theater.

At his palace in Italy, Cardinal Castaldo, Archbishop of Naples, received Cdr. Thomas Sullivan of Monrovia, and LCDR. Joseph Landau of Los Angeles. Here the squadron men presented 1,700 pounds of medical supplies, toys and gifts donated by the community.

The outstanding developments of the period, however, were sizable gains in electronics and aircraft. Factory employment was at its highest point since the early months of 1960.

The only noteworthy employment losses between October and November were in construction, food canning and agriculture and these were seasonal.

TOTAL GAIN Total employment showed a gain of 70,300 workers, or 2.6 per cent since last November.

The record-breaking level included new peaks in non-durable goods manufacturing and in the finance, service and government groups.

Unemployment declined from 173,400 in October to 167,400 in November while the rate of joblessness dropped from 5.8 to 5.6 per cent.

LAUNCHING

The third of three combination cargo-passenger vessels constructed by the Shipyards, Los Angeles Division, for the American Mail Line Ltd., of Seattle, Washington, will be launched at 9 a.m. Pacific Standard Time, January 6.

More supplies donated by Los Angeles firms, were flown to Rota, Spain and Kenitra, Morocco. The cargo left in Kenitra will later be transported to numerous new African nations.

On a cargo run to the Isle of Sardinia, the squadron flew over many U.S. Naval ships lying off the southern boot of Italy. Before the planes could be unloaded, helicopters from, observant aircraft carriers dropped down on the island field with tons of Christmas mail to be shipped home by VR-772 from the cruiser Springfield, the carriers Saratoga and Independence and supporting destroyers. With the mail came a special message: "Merry Christmas to the folks at home."

SHOPPING For their own families, the men of VR-772 had an opportunity to Christmas shop in Naples, Rome, Madrid, Gibraltar, and the Azores.

On a special Christmas note, Arthur "Beau" Beaumont, celebrated Naval Artist, traveled with the squadron on special assignment for the Navy to capture Christmas Naval scenes on his canvas.

To Cdr. Cecil E. Harris, Exec. Officer of NAS Los Alamitos, along on the flight to observe operations, this was far more than a successful training mission. Said he: "A rare opportunity due to timing, to display the need and value of our air reservists. The opportunity was more than fulfilled."
