Army Pfc. Lawrence E. Miller participated with other personnel from the 503rd Infantry Combat Team in Operation Suburbia, a week-long field training exercise on Okinawa which ended December 8.

The exercise began when members of the 503rd's Second Airborne Battle Group parachuted onto the Yontan airstrip. The jump was followed by a heavy equipment drop where trucks, artillery, construction gear and supplies necessary for the maneuver were parachuted onto the strip.

The 503rd then hiked 23 miles to Camp Hansen for two days of anti-guerrilla training. Following this, they were airlifted by helicopter to northern Okinawa for training in mountain and jungle tactics. Operation Suburbia was the largest airborne exercise ever conducted on the island.

Miller, a wireman in the team's Mortar Battery, entered the Army in June 1959 and arrived overseas in June 1960.

Police Science Course Offered To ECC Students

"It's a big field and we attempt to give the student a working knowledge of police work," John Hampton, of the police science department at El Camino College, says in describing the college's energetic program.

The statistical increase in crime today causes many people to say "why isn't something done?"

Something is being done at El Camino College. Police science courses are offered to regular police officers and those interested in becoming police officers. Classes in Penal Code, police patrol, vehicle code, juvenile delinquency, fingerprinting and laws of arrest are being taught by instructors who have had actual background and experience in the courses they are teaching.

BASIC COURSE
"We have a basic course in Penal Code concerning the laws of State of California, the history of the laws, how they originated, and legal points of law and elements of the law from the standpoint of being enforceable in California," Hampton related. "It takes fully a year to cover approximately two-thirds of the laws in the 30 other codes."

New students are encouraged to take the Penal Code class first as it offers the best opportunity for gaining an understanding of what the laws are and a little interpretation on policies and procedures. Students branching to other courses of investigation will progress more rapidly if armed with the basic knowledge of the Penal Code.

The police science courses are designed to teach the student what he is to look for when he makes an investigation as a police officer. He learns what elements he must have before he can bring a criminal to justice.

"About 10 El Camino students per year are hired by the Los Angeles Police Department and a like number go to the Sheriff's Department. This is not counting the other 13 departments in this area who are also hiring our students. Professionalization in police work is here. The City of Inglewood is now setting up requirements to include a minimum of 20 college units to become a policeman," Hampton said. "One department has an educational bonus. Officers completing 20 college units in police science receive a \$20 raise. Some of the smaller departments have already told prospective applicants that they need not apply if they don't have some education in police courses," he said.

Considerable time is spent with new students to ascertain if they have the physical requirements to become a police officer. Those who do not meet the physical requirements can go into probation or parole work. Private industry also offers employment in their security departments; insurance companies are in need of trained investigators, the veteran police sergeant pointed out.

Wood entered the Army last June, completed basic training at Fort Ord and was last stationed at Fort Sam Houston, Tex.

The 17-year-old soldier attended South High School.

Army Pvt. Wayne P. Larson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Jack C. Larson, 5109 Beran St., Torrance, is receiving eight weeks of advanced individual training at The Armor Center, Fort Knox, Ky. The training is scheduled to be concluded Dec. 16.

Larson is receiving instruction in operating the 90-millimeter tank gun and driving the Army's medium tank. He is being familiarized with the duties and responsibilities of each of the four tank crew members; the commander, driver, gunner and loader.

The 19-year-old soldier entered the Army last August at Fort Ord, Calif. Larson is a 1961 graduate of South High School.

Ronald A. Flynn, fireman apprentice, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Arthur L. Flynn of 21043 S. Shearer, and John D. Stenson, aviation boatswain's mate airman, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Involving some 10,000 men and 16 ships, the training operation centered around a fast carrier striking force subjected to air and submarine attack.

Opposition was provided by jet and conventional aircraft and by submarine, simulating attacks with all types of weapons.

During the exercise the striking force was replenished at sea by fleet oilers, stores ships and ammunition ships.

Other buses will depart from Catalina Avenue and Torrance Boulevard, Redondo Beach, 5:45 a.m.; from Hawthorne and Torrance Boulevards, Torrance, 5:54 a.m.; from Hawthorne and Artesia Boulevards, Redondo Beach, 6:08 a.m.; from Hawthorne and Rosecrans Boulevards, Lawndale, 6:13 a.m.; from Hawthorne Boulevard and Broadway, Hawthorne, 6:18 a.m.; from Hawthorne and Century Boulevards, Lennox, 6:23 a.m.; and from Manchester Avenue and Market Street in Inglewood at 6:30 a.m.

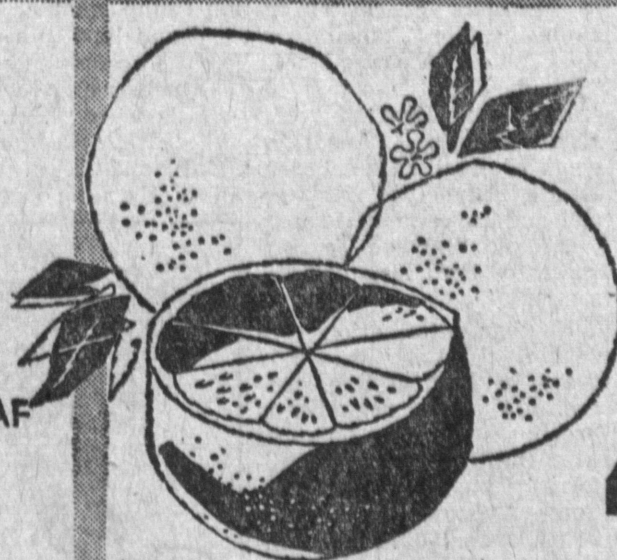
