nomination as the Republican candidate at the June, 1962, primary election, and election at the November, 1962, general election.

The endorsement of Chapel was announced by John K. Townsend, of El Segundo, chairman, Republican Central Committee, 46th District. Chapel has not made formal announcement of his candidacy because of television and radio commitments of non-political nature.

Chapel is mid-way through his sixth term in the California Legislature. He was first elected to office in 1950.

The action of the Republican Central Committee has been given the support of Republican club leaders in the district, Townsend said. Members of the Republican State Central Committee living in the 46th District have given their endorsement, Townsend added.

A native of Iowa, Chapel attended the University of Iowa, Missouri University, and the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis. He has an A.B. degree; a B.S.

degree in aeronautical engineering; and is licensed by the State of California as a professional mechanical engineer.

Assemblyman Chapel served in the Iowa National Guard Cavalry, as a Midshipman of the Navy, as an Infantry Reserve officer of the Army on active duty, and was for eleven years a regular officer of the United States Marine Corps. He served with the Marines in Nicaragua and China, aboard the U.S.S. California, and later became Judge Advocate, Fifth United States Naval District, although he never attended a law college.

Chapel has drawn on this varied background as the author of more than 4,000 published magazine and newspaper feature articles and more than a score of books. His latest book, "Guns of the Old West," was published by Coward-McCann, Inc. late in 1961.

Among Chapel's many legislative accomplishments have been the authorship of California's first anti-loan shark law in 1955; the amendment of the Shell-Cunningham Act of 1955 to prohibit oil drilling along the coast from the Ventura County line to Point Vicente, except where coastal cities control their own tidelands; obtaining funds for the "Salt Water Intrusion" project at Manhattan Beach; transfer of authority from the State Water Pollution Board to the State Department of Public Health to prevent beach pollution; obtaining State funds for the protection of Redondo's shoreline, during the pre-harbor storm years; active participation in promotion of the Redondo Beach Marina; obtaining State funds for the Manhattan Beach Pier; authorship of the "Nalline" anti-narcotic law; and sponsorship of bills to reduce the circulation of "smut."

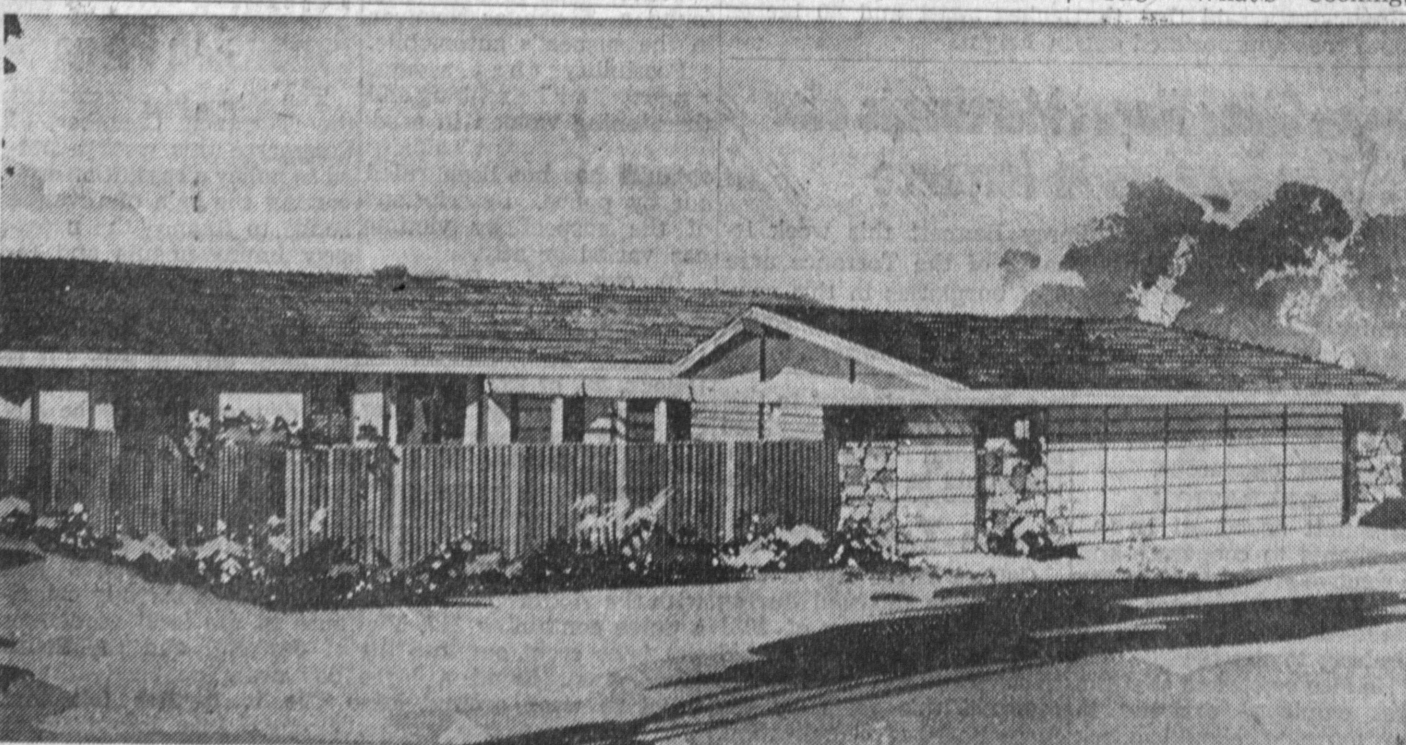
