This class will be limited to those children entering kindergarten in September, 1962. Mrs. Fritz Green span, well-known in the Child Observation program in the Torrance Unified School District, will conduct the program.

In addition to the regular

Child Observation program for pre-schoolers, there will be opportunity for supervised play with other pre-kindergarteners, working with creative materials, clay, finger and easel painting, block, train and dollhouse activity, music and rhythms. There will be special emphasis placed on preparation for kindergarten. Creative arts and crafts will be added to the program, as well as carefully planned field trips.

PARTICULAR STRESS
Particular stress will be placed on young children being given the opportunity to express themselves within a group of their own peers. For the adults, in addition

to the educational program featured, the discussion periods will be enriched with outside resource specialists from the field of child growth and development. The entire program will be geared to the four-year old level. These supervised activities and directed discussions have proved most helpful to parents and have helped prepare the children for a happier adjustment in kindergarten.
