Torrance Residents Make-Up One-Third Cast of New Play

About a third of the large cast of Hampton Players' new production, "The Visit," which opened January 12, in Redondo Beach, are residents of Torrance.

Key roles of "First Man" and "First Woman" are played by George Stefan, Hollywood Riviera and Suzanne Shinder, Torrance.

Stefan has been a devoted follower of all of Hampton's activities since its inception eleven years ago, but this is his first time on stage.

Mrs. Shinder has recently been seen in the Torrance Footlight Theatre's productions, "Lady Precious Stream" and "White Sheep of the Family." Her previous experience goes back to a little theatre in New York and school plays in her home town of Manchester, England. Almost the entire Shinder family has become involved in "The Visit," with daughter Lorraine and husband Floyd also playing small roles.

Other Torrance residents in the show are Hal Lepper, who has been seen in numerous Hampton and Chapel Theatre productions, and is presently Hampton's House Manager; Phyllis Foss, last seen on the Hampton stage in "Death of a Salesman"; Carol Foss, who was one of

the charming daughters in "The Loud Red Patrick;" Art Grigg, a new member of Hampton; and Barbara Bennett, who has worked on plays for the Hampton, Footlight and Drawing Room Theatres.

Two pioneers of Hampton Players, Bob Farnsworth and Hal Douglas, have teamed up to direct this fascinating adult drama, and Jack Drake and Marie Denn, well known local actors, are playing the lead roles.

The story is one of a life-
