

Youth Baseball Groups Start Season

Torrance Babe Ruthers, Colts, Little Leaguers Enroll for '62 Season

The first harbinger of Spring in Torrance, the start of annual Little League, Babe Ruth League and Colt League recruitment drives, gets underway this week.

Tomorrow through Jan. 22, the Torrance Colt League will stage registrations for all 15 and 16-year-old boys in the Torrance-Gardena area who wish to play baseball during the 1962 season.

Registrations will be held at the Edison School, 3800 W. 182nd St., at 7:30 p.m. Birth certificates and a one-dollar registration fee will be required.

League games will be played at North High School in Torrance. Applicants will be notified at a later date when tryouts will be held. A general meeting will be held tomorrow evening and on the evening of Jan. 22.

LITTLE LEAGUERS
Registration for the North Torrance West Little League will be held on Jan. 20 at McMaster Park from 8 a.m. to 2 p.m. Any boy between the ages of eight and 12, who will be eight

years old before the first day of August, or who will not be 13 before the same date, may register.

Each youngster must bring his birth certificate and be accompanied by a parent.

Parent registration in the association is \$1, and the insurance fee of \$1 per boy may also be paid at this time.

Boundaries for North Torrance West Little League are: Redondo Beach Blvd. on the north; 190th St. on the south; Hawthorne Blvd. on the west; and Glenburn to 182nd St. and Falda to 190th St. on the east.

Registrations will be held at the Babe Ruth Field, Plaza del Amo and Western Ave. Each youth expecting to register should bring his birth certificate.

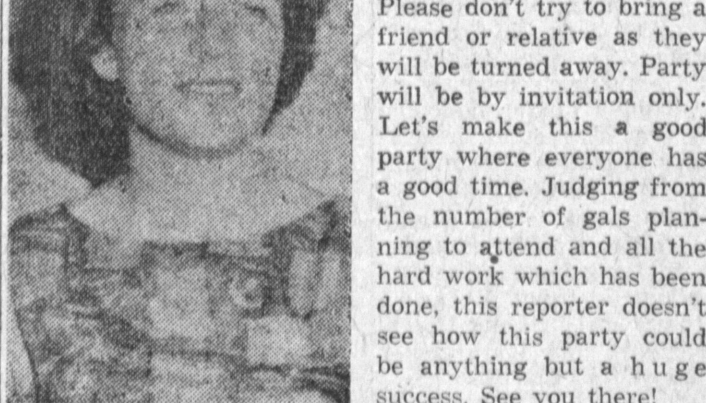
Tryouts will be held Feb. 10, 17 and 24. Registrations will also be accepted on the first two days of tryouts.

R. S. "Dick" Fitzgerald, former manager of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce was elected charter president of the newly organized West Coast Slo-Pitch Softball Association, officials announced today.

George Fowler, supervisor of the City of Gardena, Recreation and Parks Department, was elected first vice president, and Richard Warner, city of Hawthorne Recreation Department supervisor, won the second vice president post.

Elmer S. "Red" Moon, of the Torrance Recreation Department, will be the group's first executive secretary-treasurer. Official statistician will be Charles Ryan, life insurance executive of Torrance.

Fitzgerald is currently president of the California Association of Chamber of Commerce Managers and was president of the California State Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1955-56, and vice president of the United States Junior Chamber of Commerce in 1956-57. The 37-year old Chamber executive was selected as one of five California's "Outstand-

ing Young Men" in 1956.

Slo-Pitch softball, first introduced to the Pacific Coast region in 1953 by the Torrance Recreation Department, has grown in popularity in Southern California most rapidly. Three hundred fifty teams are now playing the game in 25 communities on an organized basis.

Association officials state the new inter-city league was formed to allow a major league caliber of competition of superior teams for various cities. Expected to compete in the initial season are teams from Santa Ana, Torrance, Redondo Beach, Gardena, Hawthorne, El Segundo and Los Angeles.

Within a very few years, officials predict many leagues to be formed within the Association, with resulting tournaments and play-offs.

Moon, veteran recreation official and one of the games originators, said information requests have been received from all over the nation.

The next meeting of the board of directors will be held on Jan. 26, in Torrance, to complete scheduling.

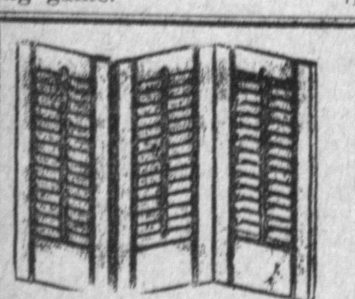
Torrance Man Receives Honors On Anniversary

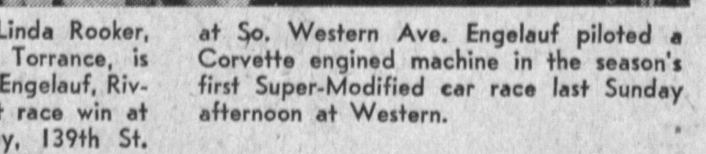

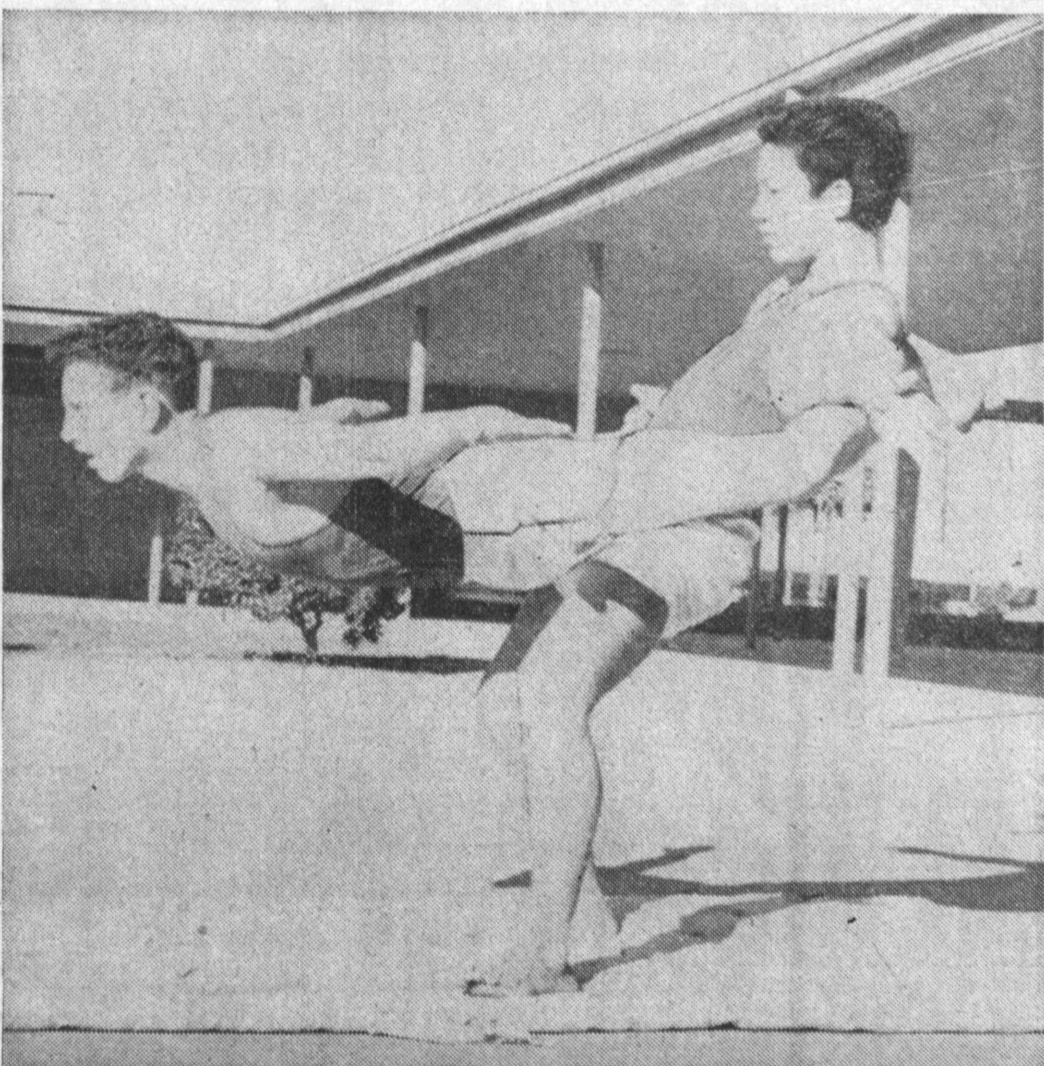
