Filing for Nomination Papers Near

Four councilmanic posts will be "up for grabs" at the April elections and the air of municipal politics is already beginning to permeate the city.

At least two new faces will be found on the city's seven man council following the election. Sources close to one candidate have rumored that he will not run for office again because of ilf health while Councilman Willys Blount has already

announced his intention of running for the office of Mayor.

Mayor Albert Isen has indicated that he will run for the office as an incumbent although he has not yet made a formal announcement.

Councilman J. A. Beasley. a Torrance insurance man, has not announced his intention of running for reelection although close friends feel that the formal an-

nouncement may be made in a few days.

January is traditionally the time for announcing candidacy for office while campaigns start slowly in February, gain momentum during the intervening months, reaching a peak in the last days before election.

FINAL DAY FEB. 15 Final day for filing nominating papers for candidates in the April 10 municipal election will be Feb. 15, it was reported last week by the office of the city clerk. Clerk will begin accepting the papers on January 25.

Offices of mayor, three councilmen, city clerk and city treasurer will be listed on the ballot. A' large number of contenders for each of the six positions are expected to file.

To date only two candidates for office have indicated that they will be contending for office. Blount who announced in mid December that he would campaign for the position of mayor, has served on the council for 12 years. He has been especially active in the development of Torrance streets as a member of the council's transportation committee and spearheaded the drive to expand facilities at the Torrance municipal airport. CLERK'S POST

Only other contender who has announced that she will seek office in April is Torrance realtor Rose Craig, who will campaign for the office of city clerk. Active in Chamber of Commerce work, charity campaigns and in the program of the Torrance-Lomita Board of Realtors, Mrs. Craig reported that she expects to wage a hard fought campaign for the office.

'A free-swinging, noholds-barred election may be expected in April with a good selection of well-qualified candidates vying for every seat," Councilman Beasley reported last night.

"With good strong candidates, with well balanced platforms, the final winners are bound to be . . . the people of Torrance!"
