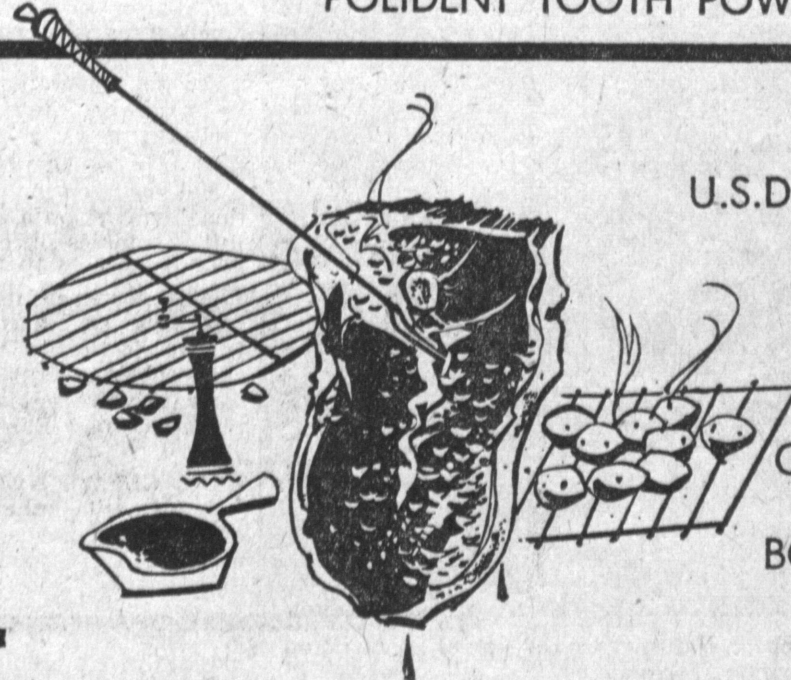

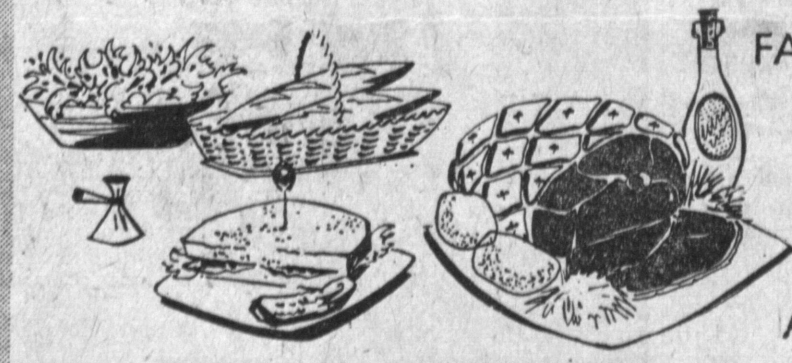

Bank Announces Special Accounts Now Available
