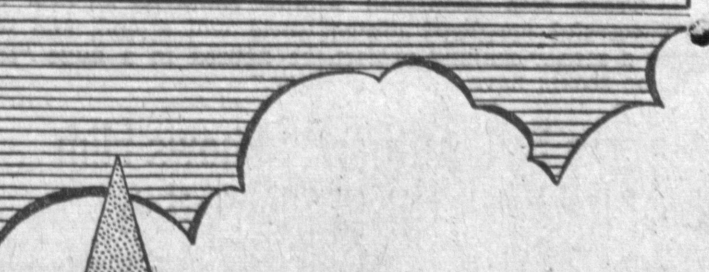

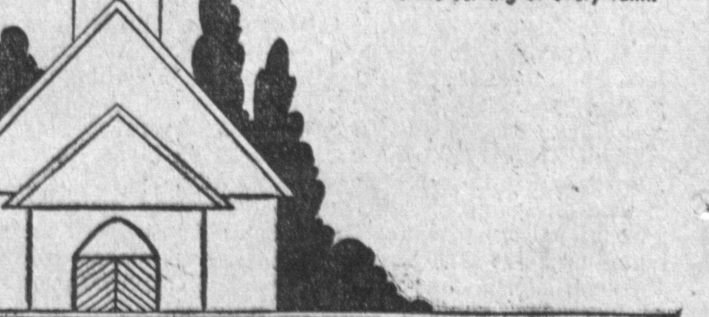

California's Lieutenant Governor Featured Speaker at El Camino Session

Lieut. Gov. Glenn M. Anderson was featured speaker at a chartering banquet of the El Camino College teachers' union Saturday night.

Anderson reviewed recent statewide educational developments for the estimated 150 teachers and guests.

Purpose of banquet was to mark the chartering of American Federation of Teachers local 1388, which recently was recognized by the El Camino College board of trustees.

Will Scoggins, president of the El Camino local, accepted the charter from Ralph Schlomming, executive secretary of the California State Federation of Teachers.

Lt. Gov. Anderson was introduced by Ben Scott of Lomita, member of the state board of education, who has just returned from a U.S. State Department mission to India.

The lieutenant governor, the native of Hawthorne, has long had an interest in El Camino College. While serving as a member of the State Assembly, he was co-author

of the original legislation creating the college.

Anderson's present duties include membership on both the Board of Regents of the University of California and the Board of Trustees of the State College system.

Political science instructor Charles Hohner was master of ceremonies for the banquet, which began at 6:30 p.m. in Campus Center I. Program included entertainment and introduction of guests.
