



## Torrance Chess Enthusiasts Invited to Play Champion

Samuel Reshevsky, one of the greatest American chess masters of all time, paid his first visit to the South Bay when he played against all comers at Clark Stadium, 861 Valley Drive in Hermosa Beach, Wednesday. More than forty players were expected to oppose Reshevsky in his simultaneous exhibition. This is not a new experience for Reshevsky—he made his first tour of the U.S. in simultaneous exhibitions in 1920 at the age of eight. Winner of international chess tournaments for the past 25 years, Reshevsky has won the championship of the United States on many occasions and is the only player to have defeated at least once all the world champions of this century—Lasker, Capablanca, Alekhine, Euwe, Smyslov, Tahl and Botvinnik.
