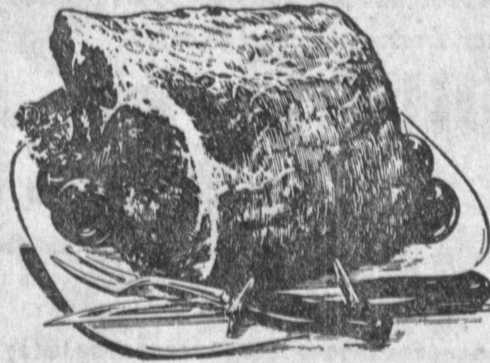

'Art of Dress' Being Taught to Torrance Women

A weekly visitor to this area beginning Feb. 7 will be Mrs. Louise Pinckney Sooy, UCLA Professor of Art Emeritus and a perennially popular university extension lecturer, who speaks with equal authority in the field of fashion or home decoration.

For local women she will give a series of university extension lectures on "The Art of Dress." Fifteen weekly meetings of her 4:30 to 6:30 class will meet in Room 302, North High School, 3620 W. 182nd St., Torrance.

For many years in her capacity of first associate, then Professor of Fine Arts on the UCLA campus, Mrs. Sooy advised succeeding college generations of young women concerning the manifold problems of interior decoration and costume design.

With Mrs. Virginia Woodbridge, another member of the University's Fine Arts faculty, she is the author of a notable volume on interior decoration called "Plan Your Own Home." She is also the author of an authoritative volume on the history of costume and has written numerous articles on fashion for women.

"Today every type of beauty aid comes in pots or bottles or packages, but no cosmetic has been able to bottle up the wisdom which women need to use this vast wealth of products.

LITTLE SCANDALS

Columnist George Sokolsky writes: "Considering the serious problems that face the President and the secretary of state, neither should be burdened with the little scandals that arise out of the maneuvers of lower officials to manipulate policy by day by day action.
