

\$25,000 Damage Suit Filed in Name of 18-Year-Old Victim

rance Police officers this week gained support when city officials indicated that they would be "backed to the limit" in pending court hearings.

An 18-year old Torrance youth has filed a \$25,000 damage suit against the two officers, Melvin J. Bennett, son of police chief Percy Bennett, and Lee James Ashman, charging that he was beaten by them at a dance June 10.

Independent investigation of the incident, conducted by the City Manager's office, indicated that the officers were first attacked and had only defended themselves.

Bennett and Ashman were not on duty at the time of the incident but had been hired privately to police the dance by the

management. Suit was filed in the name of Gary Michael

Ave. and will be heard in Los Angeles Superior Court.

Witnesses to the scuffle 'said that one of the officers was knocked down and that their hats were knocked off before D'Onofrio was arrested.

Planning Commission Works Shorthanded, Help Overdue

The most vital commission in the city sident Dave Halstead, Ken Miller, of Torrance is doing a man-sized job . . .

The Torrance Planning Commission, whose duty it is to investigate and make recommendations to the council on every issue involving zoning and building, is now operating at only a percentage of capacity because qualified men have not been appointed to the vacated post.

Two positions, formerly held by Commission President Bert Lynn, now a member of the school board, and Thirvin D. Fleetwood, whose appointment expired on Jan. 11, are vital to the effective operation of the commission. Fleetwood will continue as an interim member until a successor is named.

Under city ordinance all nominations to the commission are made by the Mayor with the approval of the council. Formerly, appointments to the commission were made by individual councilmen . . . each councilman appointing one member.

The Torrance Press would advocate a return to this policy of individual appointments in the hope that these vacancies would soon be filled from the ranks of highly qualified men who are available in our city.

Holding these posts open until after the election may be politically expedient but it also is a holdback on the progress of the community.
