## LA School District Will Bond Increase on June 5

First draft of a proposed bond issue for expansion of Los Angeles City School facilities to accommodate an expected pupil avalanche of 90,000 over present enrollments by 1965 has been presented to the City Board of Education through its building committee.

The outline of the system's needs, described as a

"rock bottom" program by school system planners, totals \$128,800,000 in its present form. As it stands at present, this is the lowest school bond program since 1946.

The proposal—definitely not a recommendation—was presented Thursday, Feb. 8, at a special meeting of the three-member building committee. Sitting in on the presentation were the remaining members of the seven-member Board of Education. Making the presentation were Virgil Volla, associate superintendent in charge of schoolhouse planning and construction, and Superintendent of Schools Jack P. Crowther.

The presentation marks the first in a series of shake-down steps which will result in a final recommendation in March of the amount to be submitted for voters' approval on the June 5 ballot. The proposed program already has been under thorough study and overhaul by school staff personnel for several months.
